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CONDITIONS OF SALE

The following Conditions of Sale, as amended by any published or posted notices or verbal announcements during the sale, constitute the entire terms and conditions on which property listed in the catalog shall be offered for sale or sold by Bonhams & Butterfields Auctioneers Corp. and any consignor of such property for whom we act as agent. If live online bidding is available for the subject auction, additional terms and conditions of sale relating to online bidding will apply; see <u>www.bonhams.com/WebTerms</u> for the supplemental terms. As used herein, "Bonhams," "we" and "us" refer to Bonhams & Butterfields Auctioneers Corp.

1. As used herein, the term "bid price" means the price at which a lot is successfully knocked down to the purchaser. The term "purchase price" means the aggregate of (a) the bid price, (b) a PREMIUM retained by us and payable by the purchaser EQUAL TO 25% OF THE FIRST \$50,000 OF THE BID PRICE, 20% OF THE AMOUNT OF THE BID PRICE ABOVE \$50,000 UP TO AND INCLUDING \$1,000,000, AND 12% OF THE AMOUNT OF THE BID PRICE OVER \$1,000,000, and (c) unless the purchaser is exempt by law from the payment thereof, any California, Arizona, Connecticut, Georgia, Illinois, Massachusetts, Nevada, New York, Pennsylvania, Texas, Washington, D.C., Washington state, or other state or local sales tax (or compensating use tax) and other applicable taxes. 2. The purchaser grants us a security interest in the property, and we may retain as collateral security for the purchaser's obligations to us, any property and all monies held or received by us for the account of the purchaser, in our possession. We retain all rights of a secured party under the California Commercial Code. If the foregoing conditions or any other applicable conditions herein are not complied with, in addition to other remedies available to us and the consignor by law, including without limitation, the right to hold the purchaser liable for the purchase price, we at our option may either (a) cancel the sale, retaining as liquidated damages all payments made by the purchaser or (b) resell the property, either publicly or privately, and in such event the purchaser shall be liable for the payment of any deficiency plus all costs and expenses of both sales, our commission at our standard rates, all other charges due hereunder, attorneys' fees, expenses and incidental damages. In addition, where two or more amounts are owed in respect of different transactions by the purchaser to us, to Bonhams 1793 Limited and/or to any of our other affiliates, subsidiaries or parent companies worldwide within the Bonhams Group, we reserve the right to apply any monies paid in respect of a transaction to discharge any amount owed by the purchaser. If not so removed, daily storage fees will be payable to us by the purchaser as set forth therein. We reserve the right to transfer property not so removed to an offsite warehouse at the purchaser's risk and expense, as set forth in more detail in the "Buyer's Guide." (b) If mediation does not resolve all disputes between the parties, or in any event no longer than 60 days after receipt of the written notice of dispute referred to above, the parties shall submit the dispute for binding arbitration before a single neutral arbitrator. Such arbitrator shall be a retired judge or an attorney familiar with commercial law and trained in or qualified by experience in handling arbitrations. Such arbitrator shall make all appropriate disclosures required by law. The arbitrator shall be drawn from a panel of a national arbitration service agreed to by the parties, and shall be selected as follows: (i) If the national arbitration service has specific rules or procedures, those rules or procedures shall be followed; (ii) If the national arbitration service does not have rules or procedures for the selection of an arbitrator, the arbitrator shall be an individual jointly agreed to by the parties. If the parties cannot agree on a national arbitration service, the arbitration shall be conducted by the American Arbitration Association, and the arbitrator shall be selected in accordance with the Rules of the American Arbitration Association. The arbitrator's award shall be in writing and shall set forth findings of fact and legal conclusions.

(c) Unless otherwise agreed to by the parties or provided by the published rules of the national arbitration service:

(i) the arbitration shall occur within 60 days following

the selection of the arbitrator;

(ii) the arbitration shall be conducted in the designated location, as follows: (A) in any case in which the subject auction by Bonhams took place or was scheduled to take place in the State of New York or Connecticut or the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, the arbitration shall take place in New York City, New York; (B) in all other cases, the arbitration shall take place in the city of San Francisco, California; and

(iii) discovery and the procedure for the arbitration shall be as follows:

(A) All arbitration proceedings shall be confidential;

(B) The parties shall submit written briefs to the arbitrator no later than 15 days before the arbitration commences;

(C) Discovery, if any, shall be limited as follows: (I) Requests for no more than 10 categories of documents, to be provided to the requesting party within 14 days of written request therefor; (II) No more than two (2) depositions per party, provided however, the deposition(s) are to be completed within one (1) day; (III) Compliance with the above shall be enforced by the arbitrator in accordance with California law;

(D) Each party shall have no longer than eight (8) hours to present its position. The entire hearing before the arbitrator shall not take longer than three (3) consecutive days;

(E) The award shall be made in writing no more than 30 days following the end of the proceeding. Judgment upon the award rendered by the arbitrator may be entered by any court having jurisdiction thereof.

To the fullest extent permitted by law, and except as required by applicable arbitration rules, each party shall bear its own attorneys' fees and costs in connection with the proceedings and shall share equally the fees and expenses of the arbitrator.

Previews

Games column for The Scientific American – never one to do things halfway, Thomas Rodgers sponsored biennial international gatherings where like-minded enthusiasts gathered, often at his home in Atlanta, set in an elegant

again, some time later, in Berkeley, and a number of telephone chats. And, finally, after I had persuaded him to join the International Association of Bibliophiles, pleasant hours spent with him and his wife Sarah Garvin at the Association's colloquium in Avignon in September 2006. What had begun as a cordial bookseller/ collector relationship had grown into a real friendship – I myself was not fully aware of it until he phoned me early this year and, in his straightforward way, informed me that he did not have long to live, and would I have any ideas about the disposal of his library. Not long afterwards, after I had written him a letter with my thoughts and recommendations, I received the news that he had died. Of course, the news was expected, vet I was astonished by the intensity of the sense of loss that Rosenthal in Avignon I felt – which led me to reflect

that in our world of bibliophily such close relationships, based solely on shared interests, are not all that unusual.

In Tom's and my case, the major interest we shared was early dictionaries - it was only gradually that I learned of his many other interests which, in the words of a person close to him, "he pursued with enthusiasm and intellect": word books, the written word in all its forms, gardening, wine, genealogy, puzzles, magic, the English language, mathematics and science. He was also a devotee of Martin Gardner, who for twenty-five years wrote the Mathematical Japanese-designed rock garden.

Whenever a dictionary came my way – whether in the form of a complete volume or a tiny medieval manuscript fragment recovered from a binding – Tom would have first option. We shared a particular fondness for the Latin dictionary compiled by the Italian Augustinian friar Ambrogio Calepino (1435-1510), which was first published in 1502 and in the ensuing three-hundred years went through an astonishing series of 211 editions, all carefully catalogued by the French bibliographer Albert Labarre of the Réserve des livres rares department of the Bibliothèque Nationale. Although Thomas Rodgers never had time to "catch up" with Labarre, he accumulated something like ninety editions - surely the largest such "hoard" in private hands. The popularity of the

dictionary was such that the Italian word "calepino" is still used today to denote "dictionary."

A less scholarly use of the word was made by my brother Felix and me while students at the University of California in 1941: we named our decrepit 1928-Ford Model-A "Calepino." Nice name for an old car, we thought. And when I told Tom the story, he agreed.

COPTIC-GREEK WORD BOOK AND GLOSSARY.

On the verso of the first leaf there is an elaborate cruciform full-page strapwork ornament; text is from f.2r through f.7r. Custom chemise and green half morocco case. VERY EARLY MINIATURE CODEX GLOSSARY AND A UNIQUE SURVIVAL OF ITS TYPE. This manuscript was described by the late Lawrence Feinberg, then of Columbia University, and selections were quoted in the Breslauer catalog: "A complete book of ten small vellum leaves ... The glossary contains approximately sixty words of Greek origin. Its purpose, perhaps also suggested by the partially damaged title, was to supplement the user's spoken as well as written vocabulary. Many of the words are difficult and secular: e.g. ... a teacher of law ... politician ... military tribune. Coptic equivalents are generally given ... A number of Greek names of Old and New Testament books are included (see f.4v). A noteworthy and unique feature of this glossary is that Greek words are listed in their assimilated Coptic forms with consequent Copticized spellings. A lexicon of Greek words in Coptic has not yet been completed and this manuscript can supply a number of additional entries, some of which are remarkable in the normally other-worldly Coptic context: e.g. ... an industrious person; ... a natural philosopher, defined here as ... one who speaks about nature. No other glossary of this type is known and only one Greek-Coptic glossary of any kind survives. Dating from the 6th century it was edited by H.I. Bell and W.E. Crum, "A Greek Coptic Glossary," Aegyptus 6 (1925) 177-226. Only small fragments of a few other glossaries are extant ... It may be surmised that this book served as a 'pocket' lexicon for a professional scribe, or one studying for the civil service or some high position in the clergy. As such it affords a rare if not unique view into one aspect of Coptic education. Written in a sloping uncial of a type which persisted for several centuries, the manuscript is difficult to date ... It is by no means impossible (indeed it is likely) that this book may be as old as the 6th or 7th century. In 706 Arabic became the official language of Egypt and the use of Greek and Coptic for official documents thereafter waned. Certain technical terms within the glossary fell out of use with the Arabic conquest." The illustration which opens the manuscript appears Arabic in style and such examples of early Arabic book ornamentation are very rare in their own right. \$12,000 - 18,000

SUBSTANTIAL MANUSCRIPT OF THE MOST CELEBRATED MEDIEVAL LEXICOGRAPHY, and, after the Bible, one of the first works of its scale to be printed (in 1460, see lot 1020). The first part of the present manuscript (ff.1r-83v) comprises a grammar in four books. The alphabetical dictionary begins on f.84v and ends on f.247 with the definition of "Humilis." The Summa grammaticalis quae vocatur Catholicon—known more simply as the Catholicon—was completed by the Dominican friar Giovanni Balbi (Johannes Balbus) in 1286. Its most immediate source was the Magnae derivations of Hugutio of Pisa (1201), a widely circulated lexicography with an un-alphabetical arrangement that necessitated the creation of alphabetical finding lists that were often copied with the manuscript. In giving the dictionary section of his Catholicon a strict alphabetical order, Balbi became "the first lexicographer to achieve complete alphabetization (from the first to the last letter of each word)" (The Oxford History of English Lexicography p 30). Equally important were the first four sections dealing with orthography, prosody, word derivations and syntax, and figures of speech. Throughout the work, Balbi quotes not only from the Bible and the writings of the saints, but makes abundant use of the Latin classics, making the *Catholicon* an important early secular work as well. "This work was the main lexical resource during the fourteenth century and for the greater part of the fifteenth. It served Petrarch and the other early Italian humanists, and from the time of its first printing, at Mainz in 1460, until the first years of the sixteenth century, it really had no serious rival. What its users read in it was a universe of thought constructed from words and the boundaries of their use" (Moss Rennaissance Truth and the Latin Language p 16). \$15,000 - 25,000

13TH CENTURY ENCYCLOPEDIA: WRITTEN IN ENGLAND BY TWO SCRIBES NOT LONG AFTER THE WORK WAS FIRST COMPILED BY BARTHOLOMEUS ANGLICUS, CIRCA 1245. De Proprietatibus rerum xv is a collection of glosses on things and places mentioned in the Bible, gathering a large number of primary and secondary sources and with particularly admirable geographical information. Bartholomaeus was a Franciscan who studied and taught at Paris and Magdeburg. His work became very successful and was translated from Latin into French in 1372 by Jean Corbechon and into English by John Trevisa in 1398, becoming one of the most important compendia of medieval knowledge. The first edition appeared in Cologne in 1472 (see lots 1022 & 1023 for other incunable editions). The present is one of the earliest possible translations, and substantially pre-dates any other Anglo-Norman copy.

Dr Ruth Dean analyzed this work in Anglo-Norman Language and Literature, 1999, and her advance research was cited when this manuscript appeared at Christie's in 1990: "The text is based heavily on Isidore (*Etymologiae*) but adapts freely in the ordering of the information ... this manuscript is arranged alphabetically by place name ... The material not based on Isidore offers penetrating insights into the society which wrote it. The entries for England (and there are separate entries for Kent, Scotland and Ireland) and Normandy are especially revealing. To the Norman aristocracy, England was the isle of Albion, colonized by Brutus after the fall of Troy (an apocryphal story made popular by Geoffrey of Monmouth), whose sons were the 'angels' of Gregory the Great, a wealthy country, the richest island in the world, full of good things, the people well-spoken and courageous. The Normans, on the other hand, live in a fertile land, with good harbors, their laws are civilized, the world's greatest city is Rouen, and the people of this province are strong, brave, fine warriors, well dressed, well spoken: 'deboneire en curage, peisible en compagnee.'"

Following the *De Proprietatibus rerum xv* is an anthology of Christian tenets (f.19v to f.21r) and a long account in rhyming couplets of the Passion (f.21v to end).

THE FIRST MODERN DICTIONARY: of the utmost rarity in private hands. 700 years before Samuel Johnson published his *Dictionary*, Papias compiled what has been called "the first fully recognizable dictionary," sharing many salient features of dictionaries in the modern sense. Papias's *Elementarium* is a monolingual dictionary, organized alphabetically (based on the first three letters), and incorporates several innovations: "[Papias] adds an indication of gender, declension or conjugation; he also proposes to mark long vowels in cases where this is not obvious. He is also the first to mention authors or texts as the authorities from which words are taken" (Mantello *Medieval Latin* p 96). Very little is known of Papias personally except that he was a cleric living in Italy, probably Lombardy. Even the name "Papias" derives from "guide" and may be a pseudonym. Manuscript copies of the *Elementarium* survive from the 12th to the 15th century; the *editio princeps* (titled *Vocabularium*) was published in Milan in 1476 and three other incunable editions were published in Venice. However, medieval manuscript copies are extremely rare in private hands. The Schoenberg database records only one other manuscript Papias at auction, or otherwise for sale, in the 20th century: a German manuscript circa 1410 offered by Sotheby's in 1903, from the collection of Sir Thomas Phillipps.

The text cites Baldi de Ubaldi, Johannes Andrea, Azo de Romanghis, Bartolus de Saxoferrato, Johannes de Lignano, Anton Batrio, and many others.





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promise of publishing the Etymologicon magnum ... was never carried into execution ... Even if it had been executed under the care of Aldus himself, it would not have been more correctly, or perhaps so beautifully, printed; since, with all his zeal for the cause of literature ... Aldus never produced any thing, for solidity and skill of workmanship, at all comparable with the Ammonius and Simplicius ... the Therapeutica of Galen ... and the Etymologicon Magnum; each printed by Callierges in the XVth century. The frequent and successful introduction of the red letter, gives a splendour as well as peculiarity to the efforts of the printer whose work is now under consideration" (Dibdin Bibliotheca Spenceriana III, p 65).

Callierges spent five years developing the Greek type which was first used to print the *Etymologicum*. In contrast to the Aldine Greek type, it was cast in one piece with its accents. Callierges, Blastos and Musurus were all fellow-Cretans. Anna Notaras was a leading figure among Byzantine expatriates in Venice. Musurus's prefatory poem is one of the most substantial early treatises on the technicalities of type-casting (see Proctor The Printing of Greek in the Fifteenth Century, 1900, pp 120-124). 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

EDITIO PRINCEPS, a crisp and attractive copy of one of the most important literary monuments from the Byzantine period (Krumbacher pp 562-570), and the largest incunable in Greek. The Suda (known under the personal name of "Suidas") was compiled in the 10th century and based on Hesychius' 5th-century lexicon. Almost more of an encyclopedia than a dictionary, the text was further expanded by Demetrius Chalcondylas [1423-1501]. A dialogue on fol. 1 between the bookseller and a student seeks therefore to justify the price of three ducats—probably a precautionary move by Chalcondylas triggered by the notorious failure of his 1493 Isocrates. The Suda is the only work printed at Milan by Bissolus and Mangius. This copy contains the first state of sheet ZZ1.8, with the four misprints in Salandus' Latin verses on ZZ8r uncorrected, and two contracted words on the same page, omitted by the compositor, stamped with type in the margin. Like the multiple dedications of the *Thesaurus graecae linguae*, this title-page suggests the irenic potential of lexicography, offering a dictionary for all German-speakers just before the war that would set one German-speaking community so bitterly against another..." "Dr Johnson performed with his Dictionary the most amazing, enduring and endearing one-man feat in the field of lexicography ... It is the dictionary itself which justifies Noah Webster's statement that 'Johnson's writings had, in philology, the effect which Newton's discoveries had in mathematics'. Johnson introduced into English lexicography principles which had already been accepted in Europe but were quite novel in mid-eighteenth-century England. He codified the spelling of English words; he gave full and lucid definitions of their meanings (often entertainingly coloured by his High Church and Tory propensities); and he adduced extensive and apt illustrations from a wide range of authoritative writers ... but despite the progress made during the past two centuries in historical and comparative philology, Johnson's book may still be consulted for instruction as well as pleasure" (PMM). Johnson wrote of it to Mrs. Thrale saying that Sir Joshua "seems to like his own performance," Hawkins said that the portrait "scraped in mezzotint by Doughty, is extremely like ... there is in it that appearance of a labouring, working mind, of an indolent reposing body, which he had to a very great degree."

When Boswell dedicated his *Life of Johnson to Reynolds*, he prefaced it with a letter of dedication: "You, my dear Sir, studied him, and knew him well: you venerated and admired him. Yet, luminous as he was on the whole, you perceived all the shades which mingled in the grand composition; all the little peculiarities and slight blemishes which marked the literary colours." 

FIRST EDITION IN ORIGINAL PARTS. The making of the OED began well before the publication of its first fascicle in 1884. The project was initiated by the formal Proposal for the Publication of a New English Dictionary by the Philological Society of 1859, which stated "The first requirement of every lexicon is, that it should contain every word occurring in the literature of the language it professes to illustrate." Attempts by the Society to realize this vision over the next two decades foundered. However, the project was reinvigorated in 1879 with the backing of the Oxford University Press and under the new and eccentric editorship of James A.H. Murray. That year, Murray issued an Appeal to the English-Speaking and English-Reading Public to Read Books and Make Extracts for the Philological Society's New Dictionary, distributing copies among British and American professors, lecturers, personal friends, and members of the Society. Taking advantage of favorable notice in the popular press, Murray encouraged non-academic readers as well to contribute slips documenting the usage and contexts of words they encountered in their reading. Enthusiasm spread quickly, and by the end of 1880, Murray had attracted 754 readers who submitted a combined 361,670 slips for the dictionary. (See Mugglestone Lost for Words pp 8-17.) The project would grow to immense proportions: originally projected as a four volume work to be published in ten years' time, the first edition of the Oxford English Dictionary was ultimately published in 125 separate parts comprising 10 volumes, requiring 44 years for its completion. In its four-plus decades the dictionary acquired the additional editorship of Henry Bradley, William Craigie, and Charles Onions. "While A New English Dictionary continued to appear on the title pages of the various parts and sections of the first edition 1884-1928, its designation as the Oxford English Dictionary was established from 1895 on the covers and the wrappers of the individual parts. It was not, however, until the 1933 edition ... that Oxford English Dictionary also appeared on the title page" (Mugglestone p 223). \$2,500 - 3,500



ROGET'S "ARRANGEMENT OF KNOWLEDGE" WAS COMPOSED AT ABOUT THE SAME TIME AS HIS ORIGINAL THESAURUS AND ON MUCH THE SAME PRINCIPALS: IT APPEARS TO BE UNPUBLISHED, AND WAS UNKNOWN TO HIS BIOGRAPHER. It may have been begun just before the original thesaurus (the earlier gatherings having watermark dates of 1799, while Roget's manuscript thesaurus is watermarked 1802 and 1803). The "Arrangement of Knowledge" is an attempt to classify learning in the same way that the Thesaurus classifies words. The subjects are ordered under the headings and sub-headings on the contents leaf in three classes: "I. Physics or the Material World. II. Metaphysics, or the Intellectual World. III. Signs [Philology]." Each class is divided into sections, the sections into further sub-sections, etc. As Donald Emblen wrote (with considerable prescience, when it is remembered that he did not know if the existence of this manuscript): "[Roget's] whole Thesaurus of English Words and Phrases (1852) was, of course, built upon a conviction that he had devised a useful and thorough-going system of classifying all human knowledge" (see his "Roget vs. Panizzi-A Collision," in The Journal of Library History 1969, 9-38, p 36). The "Arrangement of Knowledge" also has some relevance to Roget's work. on the classification of the library of the Medico-Chirurgical Society (forerunner of the Royal Society of Medicine) and the library of the Royal Society, of which he was Secretary. His work at the Royal Society led to a long and vituperative row with Antonio Panizzi who had been engaged to catalogue the library; one of the points at issue being a list of seventeen classes drawn up for the library before Panizzi was engaged. As Emblen remarks: "since the subject of the altercation was then, and is now, of prime interest to librarians and scholars—namely, the problems of cataloguing; and finally, since the row may have left a deep imprint on the mold in which Panizzi was recasting the British Museum, it would seem that any new light thrown on the matter might be worth consideration" (p 9). Armed with the "Arrangement of Knowledge" one can answer some of the furious questions which Panizzi threw at the Council, for example: "Under which of the seventeen heads, which I am instructed to adopt, am I to put books on acoustics?" (ibid p 15). The answer according to this manual is under class I ("Physics or the Material World"), part 2 ("Science of the laws of the Material World"), section 2 ("Natural Philosophy"), sub-section IV ("Acoustics"). Acoustics is divided into four further sections: "Simple Sound," "Continued Sound," "Combination of Sound," and "Applications," each of which is further itemized. Roget shows less decisiveness in other areas, the placement of Physiology, for example is deemed a section of zoology (part of Natural History) whereas it was apparently first listed as the third section of Science (both coming under the general class of Physics). What is classed as "Signs" on the contents leaf becomes "Philology" in the actual contents without further detail on individual languages or "bibliology."







PROVENANCE. Contains a Spanish dissertation on the five tones of the Chinese language. The preface states an attempt to harmonize the work with the Chinese dictionary *Jiai-Xing-Phin-Zsu-Zsien*. Francisco Diaz was a Dominican missionary whose lexicographical work is cited as a source by Francisco Varo [1627-1687], the author of the first published Mandarin grammar which appeared in 1703 (printed on Chinese paper from woodcut blocks and known in only 14 copies). Diaz began his study of Chinese as a young man in the Chinese district of Manila (Parian), as did most Jesuit missionaries bound for China, and also at the Hospital of San Gabriel. In 1634 he set off for Formosa and then proceeded to the Dominican missionary station in Fuan, which he reached in 1635. Francisco Diaz died before Varo reached Fuan but it is possible that this manuscript was edited by Antonio Diaz, another Dominican confrère, to aid Varo in his work. Varo completed his own Portuguese/Spanish-Mandarin vocabulary while imprisoned in Funing in 1670. 
