CONDITIONS OF SALE

The following Conditions of Sale, as amended by any published or posted notices or verbal announcements during the sale, constitute the entire terms and conditions on which property listed in the catalog shall be offered for sale or sold by Bonhams & Butterfields Auctioneers Corp. and any consignor of such property for whom we act as agent. If live online bidding is available for the subject auction, additional terms and conditions of sale relating to online bidding will apply; see www.bonhams.com/WebTerms for the supplemental terms. As used herein, "Bonhams," "we" and "us" refer to Bonhams & Butterfields Auctioneers Corp.

1. As used herein, the term "bid price" means the price at which a lot is successfully knocked down to the purchaser. The term "purchase price" means the aggregate of (a) the bid price, (b) a PREMIUM retained by us and payable by the purchaser EQUAL TO 25% OF THE FIRST \$50,000 OF THE BID PRICE, 20% OF THE AMOUNT OF THE BID PRICE ABOVE \$50,000 UP TO AND INCLUDING \$1,000,000, AND 12% OF THE AMOUNT OF THE BID PRICE OVER \$1,000,000, and (c) unless the purchaser is exempt by law from the payment thereof, any California, Arizona, Connecticut, Georgia, Illinois, Massachusetts, Nevada, New York, Pennsylvania, Texas, Washington, D.C., Washington state, or other state or local sales tax (or compensating use tax) and other applicable taxes. However, if the purchaser pays for all lots purchased by it from the sale in cash or by "cash equivalent" (which term is defined to include cashier's check or money order, approved check, wire transfer or other immediate bank transfer), and makes such payment in full by the payment due date specified in Paragraph 2 below, a discounted buyer's premium rate of 23% will apply to the first \$50,000 of the bid price.

2. On the fall of the auctioneer's hammer, the highest bidder shall have purchased the offered lot in accordance and subject to compliance with all of the conditions set forth herein and (a) assumes full risk and responsibility therefor, (b) if requested will sign a confirmation of purchase, and (c) will pay the purchase price in full or such part as we may require for all lots purchased. No lot may be transferred. Any person placing a bid as agent on behalf of another (whether or not such person has disclosed that fact or the identity of the principal) may be jointly and severally liable with the principal under any contract resulting from the acceptance of a bid.

Unless otherwise agreed, payment in good funds is due and payable within five (5) business days following the auction sale. Whenever the purchaser pays only a part of the total purchase price for one or more lots purchased, we may apply such payments, in our sole discretion, to the lot or lots we choose. Payment will not be deemed made in full until we have collected good funds for all amounts due.

Payment for purchases may be made in or by (a) cash, (b) cashier's check or money order, (c) personal check with approved credit drawn on a U.S. bank, (d) wire transfer or other immediate bank transfer, or (e) Visa, MasterCard, American Express or Discover credit, charge or debit card. A processing fee will be assessed on any returned checks. Please note that the amount of cash notes and cash equivalents that can be accepted from a given purchaser may be limited.

The purchaser grants us a security interest in the property, and we may retain as collateral security for the purchaser's obligations to us, any property and all monies held or received by us for the account of the purchaser, in our possession. We retain all rights of a secured party under the California Commercial Code. If the foregoing conditions or any other applicable conditions herein are not complied with, in addition to other remedies available to us and the consignor by law, including without limitation, the right to hold the purchaser liable for the purchase price, we at our option

may either (a) cancel the sale, retaining as liquidated damages all payments made by the purchaser or (b) resell the property, either publicly or privately, and in such event the purchaser shall be liable for the payment of any deficiency plus all costs and expenses of both sales, our commission at our standard rates, all other charges due hereunder, attorneys' fees, expenses and incidental damages. In addition, where two or more amounts are owed in respect of different transactions by the purchaser to us, to Bonhams 1793 Limited and/or to any of our other affiliates, subsidiaries or parent companies worldwide within the Bonhams Group, we reserve the right to apply any monies paid in respect of a transaction to discharge any amount owed by the purchaser. If all fees, commissions, premiums, bid price and other sums due to us from the purchaser are not paid promptly as provided in these Conditions of Sale, we reserve the right to impose a finance charge equal to 1.5% per month on all amounts due to us beginning on the 31st day following the sale until payment is received, in addition to other remedies available to us by law.

3. We reserve the right to withdraw any property and to divide and combine lots at any time before such property's auction. Unless otherwise announced by the auctioneer at the time of sale, all bids are per lot as numbered in the catalog and no lots shall be divided or combined for sale.

4. We reserve the right to reject a bid from any bidder, to split any bidding increment, and to advance the bidding in any manner the auctioneer may decide. In the event of any dispute between bidders, or in the event the auctioneer doubts the validity of any bid, the auctioneer shall have sole and final discretion either to determine the successful bidder or to re-offer and resell the article in dispute. If any dispute arises after the sale, our sales records shall be conclusive in all respects.

5. If we are prevented by fire, theft or any other reason whatsoever from delivering any property to the purchaser or a sale otherwise cannot be completed, our liability shall be limited to the sum actually paid therefor by the purchaser and shall in no event include any compensatory, incidental or consequential damages.

6. If a lot is offered subject to a reserve, we may implement such reserve by bidding on behalf of the consignor, whether by opening bidding or continuing bidding in response to other bidders until reaching the reserve. If we have an interest in an offered lot and the proceeds therefrom other than our commissions, we may bid therefor to protect such interest. CONSIGNORS ARE NOT ALLOWED TO BID ON THEIR OWN ITEMS.

7. All statements contained in the catalog or in any bill of sale, condition report, invoice or elsewhere as to authorship, period, culture, source, origin, measurement, quality, rarity, provenance, importance, exhibition and literature of historical relevance, or physical condition ARE QUALIFIED STATEMENTS OF OPINION AND NOT REPRESENTATIONS OR WARRANTIES. No employee or agent of Bonhams is authorized to make on our behalf or on that of the consignor any representation or warranty, oral or written, with respect to any property.

8. All purchased property shall be removed from the premises at which the sale is conducted by the date(s) and time(s) set forth in the "Buyer's Guide" portion of this catalog. Property designated with a "W" and associated purchased lots, if not removed promptly following sale, will be transferred to an offsite warehouse at the purchaser's risk and expense, as set forth in more detail in the "Buyer's Guide." Purchased property that is permitted to remain onsite at Bonhams' facility should be removed at the purchaser's expense not later than 5:00 p.m. Pacific Time five (5) business days following the date of the sale. If not so removed,

a storage fee of \$5.00 per lot per day will be payable to us by the purchaser beginning at the close of the 21st day following the sale, and we may thereafter transfer such property to an offsite warehouse at the purchaser's risk and expense. Accounts must be settled in full before property will be released. Packing and handling of purchased lots are the responsibility of the purchaser. Bonhams can provide packing and shipping services for certain items as noted in the "Buyer's Guide" section of the catalog.

9. The copyright in the text of the catalog and the photographs, digital images and illustrations of lots in the catalog belong to Bonhams or its licensors. You will not reproduce or permit anyone else to reproduce such text, photographs, digital images or illustrations without our prior written consent.

10. These Conditions of Sale shall bind the successors and assigns of all bidders and purchasers and inure to the benefit of our successors and assigns. No waiver, amendment or modification of the terms hereof (other than posted notices or oral announcements during the sale) shall bind us unless specifically stated in writing and signed by us. If any part of these Conditions of Sale is for any reason invalid or unenforceable, the rest shall remain valid and enforceable.

11. These Conditions of Sale and the purchaser's and our respective rights and obligations hereunder are governed by the laws of the State of California. By bidding at an auction, each purchaser and bidder agrees to be bound by these Conditions of Sale. Any dispute, controversy or claim arising out of or relating to this agreement, or the breach, termination or validity thereof, brought by or against Bonhams (but not including claims brought against the consignor by the purchaser of lots consigned hereunder) shall be resolved by the procedures set forth below.

Mediation and Arbitration Procedures

(a) Within 30 days of written notice that there is a dispute, the parties or their authorized and empowered representatives shall meet by telephone and/or in person to mediate their differences. If the parties agree, a mutually acceptable mediator shall be selected and the parties will equally share such mediator's fees. The mediator shall be a retired judge or an attorney familiar with commercial law and trained in or qualified by experience in handling mediations. Any communications made during the mediation process shall not be admissible in any subsequent arbitration, mediation or judicial proceeding. All proceedings and any resolutions thereof shall be confidential, and the terms governing arbitration set forth in paragraph (c) below shall govern.

(b) If mediation does not resolve all disputes between the parties, or in any event no longer than 60 days after receipt of the written notice of dispute referred to above, the parties shall submit the dispute for binding arbitration before a single neutral arbitrator. Such arbitrator shall be a retired judge or an attorney familiar with commercial law and trained in or qualified by experience in handling arbitrations. Such arbitrator shall make all appropriate disclosures required by law. The arbitrator shall be drawn from a panel of a national arbitration service agreed to by the parties, and shall be selected as follows: (i) If the national arbitration service has specific rules or procedures, those rules or procedures shall be followed; (ii) If the national arbitration service does not have rules or procedures for the selection of an arbitrator, the arbitrator shall be an individual jointly agreed to by the parties. If the parties cannot agree on a national arbitration service, the arbitration shall be conducted by the American Arbitration Association, and the arbitrator shall be selected in accordance with the Rules of the American Arbitration Association. The arbitrator's award shall be in writing and shall set forth findings of fact and legal conclusions.

CONDITIONS OF SALE - CONTINUED

(c) Unless otherwise agreed to by the parties or provided by the published rules of the national arbitration service:

- (i) the arbitration shall occur within 60 days following the selection of the arbitrator;
 - (ii) the arbitration shall be conducted in the designated location, as follows: (A) in any case in which the subject auction by Bonhams took place or was scheduled to take place in the State of New York or Connecticut or the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, the arbitration shall take place in New York City, New York; (B) in all other cases, the arbitration shall take place in the city of San Francisco, California; and
 - (iii) discovery and the procedure for the arbitration shall be as follows:
 - (A) All arbitration proceedings shall be confidential;
 - (B) The parties shall submit written briefs to the arbitrator no later than 15 days before the arbitration commences;
 - (C) Discovery, if any, shall be limited as follows: (I) Requests for no more than 10 categories of documents, to be provided to the requesting party within 14 days of written request therefor; (II) No more than two (2) depositions per party, provided however, the deposition(s) are to be completed within one (1) day; (III) Compliance with the above shall be enforced by the arbitrator in accordance with California law;
 - (D) Each party shall have no longer than eight (8) hours to present its position. The entire hearing before the arbitrator shall not take longer than three (3) consecutive days;
 - (E) The award shall be made in writing no more than 30 days following the end of the proceeding. Judgment upon the award rendered by the arbitrator may be entered by any court having jurisdiction thereof.
- To the fullest extent permitted by law, and except as required by applicable arbitration rules, each party shall bear its own attorneys' fees and costs in connection with the proceedings and shall share equally the fees and expenses of the arbitrator.

Limited Right of Rescission

If within one (1) year from the date of sale, the original purchaser (a) gives written notice to us alleging that the identification of Authorship (as defined below) of such lot as set forth in the **BOLD TYPE** heading of the catalog description of such lot (as amended by any saleroom notices or verbal announcements during the sale) is not substantially correct based on a fair reading of the catalog (including the terms of any glossary contained therein), and (b) within 10 days after such notice returns the lot to us in the same condition as at the time of sale, and (c) establishes the allegation in the notice to our satisfaction (including by providing one or more written opinions by recognized experts in the field, as we may reasonably require), then the sale of such lot will be rescinded and, unless we have already paid to the consignor monies owed him in connection with the sale, the original purchase price will be refunded.

If, prior to receiving such notice from the original purchaser alleging such defect, we have paid the consignor monies owed him in connection with the sale, we shall pay the original purchaser the amount of our commissions, any other sale proceeds to which we are entitled and applicable taxes received from the purchaser on the sale and make demand on the consignor to pay the balance of the original purchase price to the original purchaser. Should the consignor fail to pay such amount promptly, we may disclose the identity of the consignor and assign to the original purchaser our rights against the consignor with respect to the lot the sale of which is sought to be rescinded. Upon such disclosure and assignment, any liability of Bonhams as consignor's agent with respect to said lot shall automatically terminate.

The foregoing limited right of rescission is available to the original purchaser only and may not be assigned to or relied upon by any subsequent transferee of the property sold. A lot may refer to a single item or to a group of items auctioned together. We offer our catalogs by subscription or by single copy. For information on subscribing to our catalogs, you may refer to the subscription form in this catalog, call our Client Services Department, or visit our website at www.bonhams.com/us.

Previews

Auction previews are your chance to inspect each lot prior to the auction. Director's Foreword

Our 2013 California Book Fair auction opens with a strong section of continental and early printed books, many of which are being sold on behalf of a California educational institution, not to mention several continental manuscripts. Of particular note are a 15th century French Book of Hours (lot 6010) and the *edition princeps* of the Gospels in Arabic (6020). The multilingual theme continues in a section of dictionaries from the collection of Thomas Malin Rodgers, following our stupendous single-owner sale drawn from that collection in December.

The travel section features several atlases and fragments thereof, including Blaeu (6087), Mercator (6108) and Vaugondy (6122), and two plate volumes from the *Description d'Egypte* (6101). Audubon once again dominates our natural history offerings, with a double-elephant folio "Bien edition" and an octavo *Quadrupeds* in original parts.

A stunning series of couture designs from Dior's studio stand out in the art, architecture and illustration section (6142). Created by the influential designer Marc Bohan, the drawings date from his most fruitful period, the late 1960s. A wonderful letter by Claude Monet gives a sense of the artist's shock at the loss of his peer Courbet (6148), while a much lighter note is struck by a full-size *Peanuts* comic strip by Charles Schulz (6159).

We are delighted to include an impressive selection of fine press books from a New England private collection (6166-6201), including Ashendenes, Doves and Essex Houses on vellum, and myriad productions of the Kelmscott Press. In the literature section, an extensive collection of Richard Henry Dana stands out (6216), not to mention a first edition of *Paradise Lost* (6236), a phantasmagorical de Quincey manuscript (6239) and Steinbeck's Flemish baroque manuscript chest (6245).

In the Americana section, we include several groups of presidents and signers, a rare Revolutionary War broadside (6258), Jefferson's second inaugural address printed on silk (6269), Samuel Morse's stagecoach trunk (6279) and a San Francisco souvenir menu made of solid Comstock silver (6281).

We hope you can make time to come by our previews in Los Angeles and San Francisco during the Book Fair and the 'shadow' fair. Our previews take place in Los Angeles from February 8 through that weekend, and then in San Francisco from February 15-17. Our San Francisco galleries are just a few blocks from the Fair venue. Don't hesitate to contact a member of the department for more details on any lots, and as you are going around the fairs, recall the words of Thomas Jefferson in the letter we are offering as lot 6270: "Books as well as other things have limits to their value beyond which we would not go"!

This is the most detailed account of the British attempt to establish a colony in South America, and "did much to hasten the idea of English colonization in America..." (Streeter). Harcourt sailed to Guiana in 1609, staying for less than a year, but did establish a colony at the mouth of the River Waipoco, make contact with a local chief and unsuccessfully set about searching for gold. He arrived back in Bristol, England in December 1609, somewhat dispirited, but his enthusiasm was rekindled by the return of his brother with stories of rich goldmines and precious stones to be found in the interior, and commercial possibilities on the coast. Inspired, the elder Harcourt asked Prince Henry to advance his suit to the king for an exclusive administrative and commercial monopoly of the region "betweene the Ryver of Amazonas [Amazon] and the Ryver of Dessequebe [Essequibo]" (*ODNB*). A LARGELY COMPLETE COPY OF THE SPECTACULAR SECOND FOLIO OR "BIEN" EDITION OF AUDUBON'S MASTERPIECE: "THE LARGEST AND MOST AMBITIOUS COLOR PLATE BOOK UNDERTAKEN IN 19TH-CENTURY AMERICA" (Reese). In 1858 or 1859 John Woodhouse Audubon made the decision to re-publish his father's *Birds of America* using full-sized chromolithographic versions of the original hand-colored aquatints, and printing the smaller format plates two to a sheet: this would allow him to offer the book to subscribers at half the cost

of the original. Julius Bien was contracted to carry out the work of re-interpreting the original images as chromolithographs: printing the colors and only using hand-coloring where absolutely necessary. The intention was to issue the work in 45 parts, one of which would contain the text, for a total subscription price of \$500. Subscriptions were sought by John Woodhouse Audubon, but, apparently, with less success than his father had had thirty years earlier: Fries succeeded in locating only 49 copies by 1973. Unfortunately, the combination of the outbreak of the Civil War with rumored dubious dealings by some of the financial backers meant that only the first 15 parts and 7 volumes of octavo text were ever published. "Although only one-third completed when the project collapsed in 1861, the *Bien Audubon* is the largest and most ambitious color plate book undertaken in 19th-century America, rivaled only by the folio *Quadrupeds*" (Reese 40). Happily, the 150 plates that were printed by Bien include many of Audubon's most famous images: the wild turkey, the barn owl, the wood duck, the Carolina parakeet, the blue heron, the flamingo, the white-headed eagle – to name but a few. The plates are dated from 1858-1860, with most numbered with the part and series number at the upper left and the final number (corresponding to the author's 1839 Synopsis) at upper right. A whimsical talk given by Dali for a benefit at the house of his friend, patron, and subject of one of his most renowned portraits, Helena Rubenstein, Princess Arthchil Gourielli. In it, Dali announces that he is almost finished with his new book, "the first novel which describes the future events in the lives of people still alive." As example, he gives "four striking circumstances of Hitler's death from my book:

1. Hitler dies in Switzerland in most unforeseen condition.
2. Hitler dies exactly three months after the liberation of France.
3. Physically, the death of Hitler is caused by sudden asphyxiation.
4. One month after Hitler's death, America will sign the most important treaty of its existence. This treaty will be the beginning of a European Renaissance." The *New York Sun* gave notice of the reception on the day it was held, citing Dali as the guest of honor. Dali completed his only novel, *Hidden Faces*, in the fall of 1943; it was published the following year by the Dial Press.

The manuscript originates from the collection of Theodore Reade Nathan, a successful New York hotel and advertising executive, who served at one time as the executive assistant to showman Billy Rose. Rose's 1946 memoir, *Wine, Women and Words*, was illustrated by Dali.

WONDERFUL SIXTIES ARCHIVE FROM THE HOUSE OF DIOR. This incredibly deluxe portfolio was made for a wealthy girl of 23 or 24, not long after she moved from California to New York City. Marc Bohan joined Dior in 1958 and became creative director in 1960, replacing Yves Saint Laurent when he was called up for military service. He was one of Jackie Kennedy's favored designers. Many of the designs in this portfolio are dated from the winter collections of either 1965/66 or 1966/67. The sixties in general and the late sixties in particular are considered some of the most interesting years in Bohan's career: "During his first decade at Dior, he gained a reputation as a designer who could turn pop fashion into haute couture, keeping the elegance without sacrificing the youthful spirit of the clothes. Bohan designed for Dior many famously elegant ball gowns and evening dresses in exotic fabrics ... his most widely influential collections were in 1966 which featured garments based on the film 'Doctor Zhivago' with full, fur-trimmed coats, swirling calf-length dresses and high boots" (*The Fashion Model Directory*).





MONET WRITES PISSARRO MENTIONING THE DEATH OF COURBET. In this short letter, Monet grieves over the death of Gustav Courbet. Translated: "You have doubtless heard of poor Courbet's death, shot without a trial. What vile behavior on the part of Versailles, horrible, and the conduct of sick men. I have no heart for anything. All this is heart-rending."

French Realist painter Gustav Courbet [1819-1877] was a role model for younger painters like Monet and Pissarro. Politically a socialist, he was tapped by the Paris Commune after the fall of the Second Empire to reopen the galleries in Paris. During this period Courbet spoke out against the Vendome Column, the statue at the center of the Place Vendome erected by Napoleon I. Calling the column a "monument devoid of all artistic value," Courbet argued that it should be dismantled and re-erected at the Hotel des Invalides. In May of 1871, the column was demolished at the Paris Commune's direction. When the Versaille government took over later that year, the monument was ordered rebuilt and Courbet was singled out as responsible for its original destruction. He was tried in court and ordered to pay restitution. Courbet went into self-imposed exile, where his legal woes and drinking led him into decline, and died in December of 1877, a day before the first installment of restitution was due.

It's really funny.*"

Thank them politely, and then do something else."* Brandt and Baumgarten were Chandler's former agent and editor, respectively; the manuscript they had criticized was *The Long Goodbye*. 

A characteristically colorful, direct, and quotable letter by Chandler to his Hollywood agent, Swanson ("Swanie"), explaining why he wants to handle matters concerning his book rights himself. Chandler begins by "remarking in passing that you (including Eddie) are the only agent that I have been able to like," then goes on to air his grievances with former agents Bernice Baumgarten and Carl Brandt, alluding to their criticism of his draft of *The Long Goodbye* (see preceding lot for more on the subject). He then launches into a page and a half critique of the ineffectualness and superfluousness of literary agents in general. "The English agent and the American agent can't even write a contract; they don't know when royalty statements are due; they don't know if they are paid when they should be paid; they don't even know when the books are published unless they get author's copies, and they don't always get author's copies. The whole thing is just a bluff." Elsewhere he declares, "I will never again submit a book manuscript to an agent unless a publisher has first approved it. If I have to get kicked in the teeth, okay, but I won't take it from anybody but the head man." Chandler provides several other reasons for wanting to handle his book rights himself, and offers to let Swanson continue to handle matters related to motion picture, television, radio, and serial rights.



An outstanding collection, a tribute to one of the most admirable men in 19th century American letters and, in particular, to his principal work, *Two Years Before the Mast*. Dana's narrative of a voyage to Alta California in 1834-36 was one of the first to come from a deckhand rather than a ship's officer or passenger, and gives a clear picture of California in the years just prior to the influx of American settlers in the 1840s. It was a best-seller in its day, with over 175,000 copies sold in the first ten years after publication.

DE QUINCEY AS HIGH AS A PHOENIX, a fascinating, romantic Gothic fragment replete with drug-addled imagery. In part: "In a clock-case housed in a warm chamber of a spacious English mansion (inevitably as being English, so beautifully clean, so admirably preserved, [noise there is none, dust there is none, neither moth nor worm doth corrupt] how sweet it is to lie! – If thieves break through and steal, they will not steal a mummy; or not, unless they mistake the mummy for an eight-day clock. And if fire should arise, or even if it should descend from heaven is there not a Phoenix Office, able to look either sort of fire (earthly or heavenly) in the face ... Mummy or anti-Mummy, Skeleton or Anti-Skeleton, the Phoenix soars higher above both, and flaps her victorious wings in utter defiance of all that the element of fire can accomplish—making it her boast to ride in the upper air high above all malice from earthly enemies...."

De Quincey appears to be alluding, in part at least, to the so-called Manchester Mummy, the embalmed body of Hannah Beswick [1688-1758] that was stored in a clock-case at the home of Dr Charles White and became a tourist attraction. Explanations for this bizarre preservation vary: by some accounts, Beswick had a pathological fear of premature burial; others suggest that White, her family physician, could not resist the temptation to add her body to his cabinet of curiosities. De Quincey discusses White's museum in his *Autobiographic Sketches* (1853). He closes the present discourse by quoting Milton on the phoenix: "'A secular bird, ages of lives.'" Other highlights include 2 16mm print reels of *Never Love a Stranger* with 1973 invoice to canister; 8 files of photographs of head shots and contact sheets; 2 LP recordings of soundtracks for film adaptations of Robbins' work; an envelope of candid polaroids; VHS tapes, some with personal content; a group of personal framed and bound family photos, presumably Robbins' parents and grandparents etc.; personal correspondence; awards, and more.

Robbins' tremendous success as a popular novelist relied as much upon the readership's fascination with recent American history as it did on salaciousness. He was often inspired by Hollywood and the movie industry, as well as the aviation and automotive industries (*The Carpetbaggers* and *The Betsy* respectively). The contract files in particular give a unique glimpse into the way Robbins controlled and nurtured his empire.







The letter states that "Steinbeck used the chest to store manuscripts of works in progress, and came to be known as 'Merlin's Chest' or the 'Magic Chest.' It was my father's humorous contention, that work deposited within for any period of time, became quantumly better for the experience. Thus, unresolved or flawed material, perfected itself without further labor on the part of the author." Though Thomas remembers that the casket "has been in family possession since Christmas of 1950," the initials "J.S. 1936" are scratched onto the reverse side of the sliding cover. Covici published *Tortilla Flat* in 1935, and he remained Steinbeck's editor until his death in 1964. Steinbeck wrote after his death that "Pat Covici was much more than my friend.... For 30 years [he] was my collaborator and my conscience" (Railsback p 65).







FIRST EDITION; AN 18TH CENTURY DESCRIPTION OF BASEBALL. Gutschmuths was a pioneer of physical education and gymnastics. In this compendium of games and sports he describes 15 different types of ballgame, including Thorball, Schnurball, Fangball, and Prellball. Most importantly he devotes nearly seven pages to "englische Base-ball," the forerunner to American baseball played from at least 1750 by the schoolchildren of Britain. Gutschmuths also describes in detail "das deutsche-englische Ballspiel" (also known as ballstock) a cousin of English baseball played in Europe until the early 20th century. "Gutschmuths's documentation of the game is an important contribution to baseball history, because it is the strongest surviving evidence of an ancient family of European ball games that may have influenced the inception of baseball in England" (David Block, *Baseball Before We Knew It*, 2005, p 182). The first description of rounders or any other baseball-like game did not appear in English until 1828. See also *The Dickson Baseball Dictionary*, 2011.

GENTLEMEN,

THE evils which we have long foreseen are now come upon this town and province, the long meditated stroke is now given to the civil liberty of this country? How long we may be allowed the enjoyment of our religious liberty is a question of infinite moment. Religion can never be retained in it's purity where tyranny has usurped the place of reason and justice. The bill for blocking up the harbour of Boston is replete with injustice and cruelty, thousands of innocent men, besides women and infants, are by it reduced to indigence and distress; and though we in this town more immediately feel this distress, yet our brethren in the other towns of this province, and all the other colonies, must see that we suffer in the common cause, and that they themselves must soon realize the sufferings under which we now labour, if no means are discovered for our relief. But if any should think that this town alone is to groan under the weight of arbitrary power, we are now furnished by our enemies with a still more glaring evidence of a fixed plan of the British administration to bring the whole continent into the most humiliating bondage. A bill has been brought into parliament apparently for the purpose of taking away our charter rights, wherein it is to be enacted that the councillors shall be appointed by mandamus from the king, that our justices of the superior court, justices of our inferior courts, and justices of the peace, shall be all appointed by the governor alone, without the advice of the council, and all of them, excepting the justices of the superior court be removable by him at his pleasure, that our juries shall not be chosen by the freeholders, as they heretofore have been, but by the sheriff of the county, and that this sheriff shall not be appointed by the governor and council as heretofore, but by the governor alone, so that our lives and properties are to be decided upon by judges appointed by the governor alone, and by juries chosen by a sheriff who must be entirely under the influence of the governor as he is appointed by him, and is removable by him alone, whenever he shall discover a reluctance to conform to the will of the governor. Surely if we suffer these things we are the most abject slaves. If a favorite of a perverse governor should pretend a title to our lands, or any other part of our property, we need not doubt but a very small degree of evidence in support of the claim, would be judged sufficient, especially as the bill makes provision, that upon the motion of either of the parties, it shall be lawful to try the cause in another county than that in which the action was brought, so that a man is to be carried into a distant part of the province, instead of having his cause tried in his own county, and to be tried by strangers with whom the good or bad characters of the parties or of the witnesses can have no weight, contrary to the very spirit of magna charta. Of what value are our lands or estates to us, if such an odious government should be established among us? Can we look with pleasure on the inheritance left by our ancestors, or on the fields cultivated by our industry? When we reflect that all our labours have made them only a more inviting prey to our enemies, will not the vine-yard of Naboth be ever in our minds? But lest any thing should be wanting to complete our misery, another bill is also prepared, which enables the governor to seize any person or persons, who, under

the pretext of supporting or carrying into execution the late or other acts of the British parliament, shall murder and destroy the people of this country, from being tried in this province (even if they should be indicted by such grand juries as shall be chosen by the sheriff of the county in the same manner that we have mentioned that petty juries are to be returned) but the person indicted with such witnesses as he and the prosecutor (which will be the crown) shall judge proper, shall be sent to either of the other colonies, or even to Great Britain, to be tried for murdering the inhabitants of the Massachusetts-Bay. And provision is also made to prevent our meeting together in our corporate capacity as a town, unless it be once in the month of March for the election of the town officers, except the matter or business of the meeting is laid before the governor, and his leave in writing is obtained for a meeting of the town.

There is but one way that we can conceive of, to prevent what is to be deprecated by all good men, and ought by all possible means to be prevented, viz. The horrors that must follow an open rupture between Great Britain and her colonies; or on our part, a subjection to absolute slavery: And that is by affecting the trade and interest of Great Britain, so deeply as shall induce her to withdraw her oppressive hand. There can be no doubt of our succeeding to the utmost of our wishes if we universally come into a solemn league, not to import goods from Great Britain, and not to buy any goods that shall hereafter be imported from thence, until our grievances shall be redressed. To this, or even to the least of these shameful impositions, we trust in God, our countrymen never will submit.

We have received such assurances from our brethren in every part of the province of their readiness to adopt such measures as may be likely to save our country, that we have not the least doubt of an almost universal agreement for this purpose; in confidence of this, we have drawn up a form of a covenant to be subscribed by all adult persons of both sexes; which we have sent to every town in the province, and that we might not give our enemies time to counteract us, we have endeavoured that every town should be furnished with such a copy on or before the fourteenth day of this month, and we earnestly desire that you would use your utmost endeavours that the subscription paper may be filled up as soon as possible, that to they who are in expectation of overthrowing our liberties may be discouraged from prosecuting their wicked designs; as we look upon this the last and only method of preserving our land from slavery without drenching it in blood, may God prosper every undertaking which tends to the salvation of his people. We are, &c.

Immediately following Jefferson's second inaugural speech on March 4, 1805, newspapers from across the Northeast rushed to publish the text, starting with the Baltimore *American* the following day. Subsequent papers followed suit as the text reached outlying areas, with the first printing in Massachusetts in the Boston *Democrat* on March 16th. Not to be outdone, the *Democrat* printed the text to fill its entire front page, and was apparently the first to issue a deluxe souvenir broadside version for sale on the same day, printed on commemorative white satin. In the publisher's words, "This document cannot be raised in the estimation of our readers, by any comments within our power to advance. To pay our small tribute of respect to its author, we have directed our attention for its display in the Democrat, in some degree correspondent with its invaluable merit. Those who wish it preserved as an ornament, to adorn the parlor, while it will afford a rich treasure of instruction for their budding offspring; are respectfully informed that we have printed a number on elegant WHITE SATIN, to answer so desirable a purpose." The exact number of subscribers is uncertain, but only a handful of copies have been located in institutional libraries (see Cunningham, *The Inaugural Addresses of Thomas Jefferson, 1801 and 1805*, 2001, p 90 and figure 6-3).



The Wide Awakes were one of the best-known and most influential grassroots political organizations of 19th century America. They wore oil-cloth caps and capes as they carried kerosene torches in nighttime parades, the torch being the most prominent symbol of "Wide Awake" vigilance against the atrocities of slavery. The organization of the Wide Awakes was a significant factor enabling the first wave of mass volunteering for the Union army.



A note in secretarial hand on the same sheet reports that McClellan has "seen Mr. Knapp as requested by his Excellency the President...." John Sullivan Knapp was promoted to First Lieutenant in September of 1862, and spent the winter of 1862-63 on recruiting duty. He was the son of Nathan M. Knapp, a state legislator from Illinois, and a delegate to the 1860 Republican convention that nominated Lincoln for the presidency.





With the Southern ports blockaded after the fall of Fort Sumter, and the comparative lack of manufacturing in the South, the Confederate Navy was forced to take an unconventional approach to war at sea. The *Tallahassee* was a converted blockade runner, originally called the *Atlanta*; a steam cruiser, her top speed was a swift seventeen knots. Mallory orders Wood to sail from Wilmington, NC, and "pay proper attention to the shores of New England and its fisheries." He further notes that "the medicine chests of captured and destroyed vessels ... as well as their nautical instruments and charts, should be preserved." In August of 1864, under Wood's command, the *Tallahassee* burned and scuttled 26 Union ships.





MONROE CONDEMNS INFRASTRUCTURE IMPROVEMENTS AS UNCONSTITUTIONAL: "I Consider It My Duty to Take My Stand Against the Powers of the Federal Government." Monroe takes a strong stand, in the spirit of Jefferson, to oppose publicly funded improvements to the transportation system or indeed any internal improvements. This was a heady topic in the years following the close of the War of 1812 when American trade and technology was advancing rapidly. Monroe had recently won his second term as President and here mentions he is writing a position paper on the topic. In part, he promises "perfect simplicity and candour ... soon after I came into this office, I considered it my duty, to take my stand against the powers of the general government in regard to internal improvements: that I declared in a message to Congress, that I did not think that it possess'd that power, & that I should be compelled to refuse my assent to any bill founded on that principle." He notes that he has corresponded with James Madison and has prepared a statement to be included in his third annual address (later decided against). "I have been guided by principle only, aided by my own experience and observations, and by the lights which virtuous & enlightened men have shed on it."

At a distant period back, while I held the office of Ch. Magistrate, he was introduced to me by a letter from Govr. He reminds me that I acted under the influence of that recommendation, and promoted his objects in Europe in commerce by letters to public officers then ... I am informed, by the best authority here, that he is engaged extensively in commerce, in both hemispheres, the operation of which are well conducted and attended with success." The friend in question is likely Silas Enoch Burrows [1794-1870], a New York banker and and maritime entrepreneur.



MORSE'S STAGECOACH TRUNK, USED BY HIM TO HOLD IMPORTANT PAPERS DURING HIS TRAVELS TO PROMOTE TRANSCONTINENTAL TELEGRAPHY. Samuel F.B. Morse [1791-1872] trained as an artist with an interest in the subject of electricity. He became interested in telegraphy in 1832 after overhearing a conversation about electromagnetism while traveling between Europe and America. The technology for the telegraph already existed at that time, but it was a cumbersome model requiring a different wire for each letter. Morse set about developing a system that

would use only one wire for transmitting information. Next, he realized that the most effective way to transmit would be via a simple code of dots and dashes. His telegraph device was first exhibited in New York in 1838; by 1842 he convinced Congress to grant him \$30,000 for further development. By 1844 he sent the first inter-city message ("What hath God wrought?") between Washington and Baltimore, and soon after the telegraph spread quickly across the continental United States, often following the paths established by the railways.

Family lore holds that this was Morse's personal stagecoach trunk, used to hold important papers during his travels. The trunk likely dates from the first quarter of the 19th century: the newsprint used to line the interior dates from approximately 1805 (with extensive coverage of Jefferson's treaty with the Choctaws).

These maps are in remarkable condition given their size, and in their original wooden holder. They were presumably for use by a large corporation, planning the movement of goods around the United States. At the time these maps were published, the railways were the only sensible way to move goods about the country. With the advent of the motor car and the strong political lobby that accompanied it, the railway network was whittled down to a shadow of its former self. The 7 maps would cover an area of 297 square feet if laid out, and form a map 12 foot high and 20 foot long. Rand started as a printer of railway tickets in 1852, and in 1872 took on McNally as a partner, who

took them into publishing of railway maps, and their commercial publishing became the heart of the company. This large map was first issued in 1888 at this scale and reissued in 1891. Up-to-date information would have been crucial for the success of any business.




REVOLUTIONARY WAR—BRITISH HOUSE OF LORDS.

Manuscript on paper, approximately 163 ll, folio, [London], October 26, 1775-May 23, 1776, being an abridged version of the *Journals of the House of Lords*, period sheep-backed boards, occasional spotting, lacking spine, upper cover detached, first few gatherings loose or working loose.

EVENTS AT THE HOUSE OF LORDS IN A CRUCIAL YEAR IN AMERICA'S HISTORY. In August of 1775, George III had issued his Proclamation of Rebellion, a response to the Battle of Bunker Hill. The present ledger begins on the opening of Parliament; the King on that occasion reiterated that the rebellion was the work of a "desperate conspiracy" and that he intended to use armed force to quell it. The journal records that "*The L^d. Camden presented to the House a Petition ... praying that Conciliatory Measures may be adopted with respect to America.*" Lord Cavendish then suggests that a dearth of information about the "*State and Condition of the Colonies*" has resulted in measures being taken that "*rather encreased than diminished [the Disorders and Discontents in the British Colonies].*" By gathering intelligence, he aims to avoid "*the alarming and dangerous Expedient of calling in Foreign Forces to the Support of His Majesty's Authority within His own Dominions and the still more dreadful Calamity of shedding British Blood by British Hands.*"

In subsequent days, the Olive Branch Petition is read, and Richard Penn appears before the House arguing that "*said Petition affords Ground of Conciliation of the unhappy Differences subsisting between the Mother Country and the Colonies,*" and that all efforts should be taken to achieve a peaceful outcome. Come November, discussions focus on the logistics of sending land troops to America; by March of 1776, the suggestion is made that if the Colonies promptly submit a petition to the King listing their "*Just Right and real Grievances*" then a truce will be declared. Finally, as diplomatic negotiations fail, legislation tends towards the supplying of troops with provisions and arms.

"EVERY EYE IS DIRECTED TOWARDS S. CAROLINA..." THE NEWLY-ELECTED V.P. DESCRIBES THE PASSAGE OF THE FORCE BILL DURING THE NULLIFICATION CRISIS." In 1832 South Carolina attempted to declare that the federal Tariffs of 1828 and 1832 were unconstitutional and therefore null and void within the state's sovereign boundaries. Many Southerners had expected that with Andrew Jackson's election the controversial tariffs would be repealed or renegotiated, but, in the event, Jackson issued the Force Bill, authorizing the President to use military forces against South Carolina.

In part, "*I am ashamed of myself for not having written to you before but you know how it is with me in this respect, and in addition to other obstacles I have for the last two weeks been afflicted with a cold which would have put me to bed but for the exciting scenes through which we have passed ... I witnessed a very general disposition on the part of the rejectors to be civil. Most of them came up to me & shook hands. With Webster that ceremony did not take place until the inauguration ball ... Every eye is directed to S. Carolina. Her delegation went off in a great rage in consequence of the passage of the enforcement Bill by so unprecedented a majority. Her course is not certain but my impression is that she will revoke her ordinance but denounce bitterly the enforcement law[?] and probably nullify it although such madness is not probable...."*



A notice in a 1781 issue of the *Pennsylvania Gazette* indicates that young Bremer deserted his unit in that year (the officer in charge offered a bounty of \$20 for the return of Bremer and others). Washington, however, was famously lenient toward deserters, knowing full well that they suffered from deprivations and lack of pay. Bremer must have returned to his unit, and, as this document attests, was honorably discharged at the end of the war. The notations and dockets on the verso indicate that the discharge was used by Bremer to collect a land grant, among other legal purposes.



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
