# CONDITIONS OF SALE

The following Conditions of Sale, as amended by any published or posted notices or verbal announcements during the sale, constitute the entire terms and conditions on which property listed in the catalog shall be offered for sale or sold by Bonhams & Butterfields Auctioneers Corp. and any consignor of such property for whom we act as agent. If live online bidding is available for the subject auction, additional terms and conditions of sale relating to online bidding will apply; see <u>www.bonhams.com/WebTerms</u> for the supplemental terms. As used herein, "Bonhams," "we" and "us" refer to Bonhams & Butterfields Auctioneers Corp.

1. As used herein, the term "bid price" means the price at which a lot is successfully knocked down to the purchaser. The term "purchase price" means the aggregate of (a) the bid price, (b) a PREMIUM retained by us and payable by the purchaser EQUAL TO 25% OF THE FIRST \$100,000 OF THE BID PRICE, 20% OF THE AMOUNT OF THE BID PRICE ABOVE \$100,000 UP TO AND INCLUDING \$2,000,000, AND 12% OF THE AMOUNT OF THE BID PRICE OVER \$2,000,000, and (c) unless the purchaser is exempt by law from the payment thereof, any California, Arizona, Colorado, Connecticut, Florida, Georgia, Illinois, Massachusetts, Nevada, New York, Pennsylvania, Texas, Washington, D.C., Washington state, or other state or local sales tax (or compensating use tax) and other applicable taxes.

2. On the fall of the auctioneer's hammer, the highest bidder shall have purchased the offered lot in accordance and subject to compliance with all of the conditions set forth herein and (a) assumes full risk and responsibility therefor, (b) if requested will sign a confirmation of purchase, and (c) will pay the purchase price in full or such part as we may require for all lots purchased. No lot may be transferred. Any person placing a bid as agent on behalf of another (whether or not such person has disclosed that fact or the identity of the principal may be jointly and severally liable with the principal under any contract resulting from the acceptance of a bid.

Unless otherwise agreed, payment in good funds is due and payable within five (5) business days following the auction sale. Whenever the purchaser pays only a part of the total purchase price for one or more lots purchased, we may apply such payments, in our sole discretion, to the lot or lots we choose. Payment will not be deemed made in full until we have collected good funds for all amounts due.

Payment for purchases may be made in or by (a) cash, (b) cashier's check or money order, (c) personal check with approved credit drawn on a U.S. bank, (d) wire transfer or other immediate bank transfer, or (e) Visa, MasterCard, American Express or Discover credit, charge or debit card. A processing fee will be assessed on any returned checks. Please note that the amount of cash notes and cash equivalents that can be accepted from a given purchaser may be limited.

The purchaser grants us a security interest in the property, and we may retain as collateral security for the purchaser's obligations to us, any property and all monies held or received by us for the account of the purchaser, in our possession. We retain all rights of a secured party under the California Commercial Code. If the foregoing conditions or any other applicable conditions herein are not complied with, in addition to other remedies available to us and the consignor by law, including without limitation, the right to hold the purchaser liable for the purchase price, we at our option may either (a) cancel the sale, retaining as liquidated damages all payments made by the purchaser or (b) resell the property, either publicly or privately, and in such event the purchaser shall be liable for the payment of any deficiency plus all costs and expenses of both

sales, our commission at our standard rates, all other charges due hereunder, attorneys' fees, expenses and incidental damages. In addition, where two or more amounts are owed in respect of different transactions by the purchaser to us, to Bonhams 1793 Limited and/ or to any of our other affiliates, subsidiaries or parent companies worldwide within the Bonhams Group, we reserve the right to apply any monies paid in respect of a transaction to discharge any amount owed by the purchaser. If all fees, commissions, premiums, bid price and other sums due to us from the purchaser are not paid promptly as provided in these Conditions of Sale, we reserve the right to impose a finance charge equal to 1.5% per month on all amounts due to us beginning on the 31st day following the sale until payment is received, in addition to other remedies available to us by law.

3. We reserve the right to withdraw any property and to divide and combine lots at any time before such property's auction. Unless otherwise announced by the auctioneer at the time of sale, all bids are per lot as numbered in the catalog and no lots shall be divided or combined for sale.

4. We reserve the right to reject a bid from any bidder, to split any bidding increment, and to advance the bidding in any manner the auctioneer may decide. In the event of any dispute between bidders, or in the event the auctioneer doubts the validity of any bid, the auctioneer shall have sole and final discretion either to determine the successful bidder or to re-offer and resell the article in dispute. If any dispute arises after the sale, our sales records shall be conclusive in all respects.

5. If we are prevented by fire, theft or any other reason whatsoever from delivering any property to the purchaser or a sale otherwise cannot be completed, our liability shall be limited to the sum actually paid therefor by the purchaser and shall in no event include any compensatory, incidental or consequential damages.

6. If a lot is offered subject to a reserve, we may implement such reserve by bidding on behalf of the consignor, whether by opening bidding or continuing bidding in response to other bidders until reaching the reserve. If we have an interest in an offered lot and the proceeds thereform other than our commissions, we may bid therefor to protect such interest. CONSIGNORS ARE NOT ALLOWED TO BID ON THEIR OWN ITEMS.

7. All statements contained in the catalog or in any bill of sale, condition report, invoice or elsewhere as to authorship, period, culture, source, origin, measurement, quality, rarity, provenance, importance, exhibition and literature of historical relevance, or physical condition ARE QUALIFIED STATEMENTS OF OPINION AND NOT REPRESENTATIONS OR WARRANTIES. No employee or agent of Bonhams is authorized to make on our behalf or on that of the consignor any representation or warranty, oral or written, with respect to any property.

8. All purchased property shall be removed from the premises at which the sale is conducted by the date(s) and time(s) set forth in the "Buyer's Guide" portion of this catalog. Property designated with a "W" and associated purchased lots, if not removed promptly following sale, will be transferred to an offsite warehouse at the purchaser's risk and expense, as set forth in more detail in the "Buyer's Guide." Purchased property that is permitted to remain onsite at Bonhams' facility should be removed at the purchaser's expense not later than 5:00 p.m. Pacific Time five (5) business days following the date of the sale. If not so removed, a storage fee of \$5.00 per lot per day will be payable to us by the purchaser beginning at the close of the 21st day following the sale, and we may thereafter transfer such property to an offsite warehouse at the purchaser's risk and expense. Accounts must be settled in full before property will be released. Packing and handling of purchased lots are the responsibility of the purchaser. 10. These Conditions of Sale shall bind the successors and assigns of all bidders and purchasers and inure to the benefit of our successors and assigns. No waiver, amendment or modification of the terms hereof (other than posted notices or oral announcements during the sale) shall bind us unless specifically stated in writing and signed by us. If any part of these Conditions of Sale is for any reason invalid or unenforceable, the rest shall remain valid and enforceable.

11. These Conditions of Sale and the purchaser's and our respective rights and obligations hereunder are governed by the laws of the State of California. By bidding at an auction, each purchaser and bidder agrees to be bound by these Conditions of Sale. Any dispute, controversy or claim arising out of or relating to this agreement, or the breach, termination or validity thereof, brought by or against Bonhams (but not including claims brought against the consignor by the purchaser of lots consigned hereunder) shall be resolved by the procedures set forth below.

#### **Mediation and Arbitration Procedures**

(a) Within 30 days of written notice that there is a dispute, the parties or their authorized and empowered representatives shall meet by telephone and/or in person to mediate their differences. If the parties agree, a mutually acceptable mediator shall be selected and the parties will equally share such mediator's fees. The mediator shall be a retired judge or an attorney familiar with commercial law and trained in or qualified by experience in handling mediations. Any communications made during the mediaton process shall not be admissible in any subsequent arbitration, mediation or judicial proceeding. All proceedings and any resolutions thereof shall be confidential, and the terms governing arbitration set forth in paragraph (c) below shall govern.

(b) If mediation does not resolve all disputes between the parties, or in any event no longer than 60 days after receipt of the written notice of dispute referred to above, the parties shall submit the dispute for binding arbitration before a single neutral arbitrator. Such arbitrator shall be a retired judge or an attorney familiar with commercial law and trained in or qualified by experience in handling arbitrations. Such arbitrator shall make all appropriate disclosures required by law. The arbitrator shall be drawn from a panel of a national arbitration service agreed to by the parties, and shall be selected as follows: (i) If the national arbitration service has specific rules or procedures, those rules or procedures shall be followed; (ii) If the national arbitration service does not have rules or procedures for the selection of an arbitrator, the arbitrator shall be an individual jointly agreed to by the parties. If the parties cannot agree on a national arbitration service, the arbitration shall be conducted by the American Arbitration Association, and the arbitrator shall be selected in accordance with the Rules of the American Arbitration Association. The arbitrator's award shall be in writing and shall set forth findings of fact and legal conclusions.

# CONDITIONS OF SALE - CONTINUED

(c) Unless otherwise agreed to by the parties or provided by the published rules of the national arbitration service:

(i) the arbitration shall occur within 60 days following the selection of the arbitrator;

(ii) the arbitration shall be conducted in the designated location, as follows: (A) in any case in which the subject auction by Bonhams took place or was scheduled to take place in the State of New York or Connecticut or the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, the arbitration shall take place in New York City, New York; (B) in all other cases, the arbitration shall take place in the city of San Francisco, California; and

(iii) discovery and the procedure for the arbitration shall be as follows:

(A) All arbitration proceedings shall be confidential;

(B) The parties shall submit written briefs to the arbitrator no later than 15 days before the arbitration commences;

(C) Discovery, if any, shall be limited as follows: (I) Requests for no more than 10 categories of documents, to be provided to the requesting party within 14 days of written request therefor; (II) No more than two (2) depositions per party, provided however, the deposition(s) are to be completed within one (1) day; (III) Compliance with the above shall be enforced by the arbitrator in accordance with California law;

(D) Each party shall have no longer than eight (8) hours to present its position. The entire hearing before the arbitrator shall not take longer than three (3) consecutive days;

(E) The award shall be made in writing no more than 30 days following the end of the proceeding. Judgment upon the award rendered by the arbitrator may be entered by any court having jurisdiction thereof.

To the fullest extent permitted by law, and except as required by applicable arbitration rules, each party shall bear its own attorneys' fees and costs in connection with the proceedings and shall share equally the fees and expenses of the arbitrator.

#### Limited Right of Rescission

If within one (1) year from the date of sale, the original purchaser (a) gives written notice to us alleging that the identification of Authorship (as defined below) of such lot as set forth in the BOLD TYPE heading of the catalog description of such lot (as amended by any saleroom notices or verbal announcements during the sale) is not substantially correct based on a fair reading of the catalog (including the terms of any glossary contained therein), and (b) within 10 days after such notice returns the lot to us in the same condition as at the time of sale, and (c) establishes the allegation in the notice to our satisfaction (including by providing one or more written opinions by recognized experts in the field, as we may reasonably require), then the sale of such lot will be rescinded and, unless we have already paid to the consignor monies owed him in connection with the sale, the original purchase price will be refunded.

# Idar-Oberstein—500 Years of Gem Carving History

The town of Idar-Oberstein, located in a scenic valley of the Hunsrück Mountains in the western part of Germany, is actually a pair of villages a few miles apart which were politically joined in 1933. Oberstein is known for its jewelry manufacturing and Idar is the gem cutting center. Little known to Americans except those in the gem trade, in Europe, this town is known as the "gemstone city" or *Edelsteinstadt* and has become an increasingly popular tourist destination.

Historical records indicate that its 500-year-plus history and remarkable traditions of gemstone cutting developed when miners found agates and amethyst crystals in Miocene-age basalt formations nearby. However, many cutters in Idar claim that agate mining and cutting dates back to Roman times, due to evidence of some Roman settlements not far away and a Roman road that runs near an important source of cutting material.

Today the manufacturing there includes various cut gems, although originally, the industry was founded only on the local deposits—particularly agate —but also jasper, rock crystal, amethyst, and smoky quartz.

The city's development of the agate industry, in the beginning of the 16th century, was based on these mineral deposits, the

availability of local sandstone used for the cutting and polishing wheels, and water power to work the wheels. By the 1700s, there were about 15 workshops cutting agate which used the nearby Nahe River for energy—a number which doubled by the year 1800. However, when dwindling local agate deposits caused a slow down in the industry and many cutters left the area. These emigrants discovered large agate deposits in Brazil, they brought the material back and the cutting industry again began to flourish. By the late 19<sup>th</sup> Century as many as 150 cutting shops were in existence and the industry expanded from cutting agate and jasper into carving various types of stone objects such as dishes, goblets, bowls, snuff boxes, cane heads, parasol handles, fancy buttons, and even beads.

Now a town of about 50,000 inhabitants, Idar-Oberstein is recognized as the most significant European cutting center for gemstones, other than diamond—and some of the original family businesses are still in existence. The German Gemstone Museum, *(Deutsches Edelsteinmuseum, situated there, devoted entirely to the display of minerals and cut gems, jewelry, and carvings, is considered by many connoisseurs to be the best of its kind in the world.*

The much-coveted, rarely seen blue-green coloration exhibited in this woolly mammoth tusk was produced by its burial in the permafrost in which it lay entombed since the last Ice Age. Also boasting a graceful double curve, the finely polished specimen displays rich brown, tan and deep blue-green hues plentifully interspersed over the entire specimen.

Woolly mammoths are perhaps the quintessential Ice Age mammal. Using their tusks to sift the snow looking for vegetation to eat, and ever alert for the crunching snow of a predator or man, they inhabited the frozen wastelands of the Pleistocene to the Early Holocene. Approximately the size of an Asian elephant, their double coat of hair and their storage of fat provided warmth. Unlike modern elephants, the woolly mammoth's ears were small (elephants use their ears to cool themselves and, as the mammoth lived in a cold environment, large ears were unnecessary.) The males may have used their tusks for combat or in competition for females.

Fine carving in the Chinese taste covers the majority of the tusk with various traditional emblems of a happy Budddha, coins, clouds. Following the ban on elephant ivory in 1972, woolly mammoth tusks became a desirable material to use as a medium for fine Chinese carvings. *Length 6'9". 

# H.H. Nininger Mineral Collection Consisting of Over 150 Specimens

Known as the "Father of Meteoritics." Dr. H. H. Nininger (Harvey Harlow Nininger, January 17, 1887 - March 1, 1986) was an American meteoriticist and educator, who is credited with reviving interest in the scientific study of meteorites. He assembled one of the largest personal collections of meteorites in the world. which was later sold to the British Museum of Natural History and the Arizona State University Center for Meteorite Studies. He founded the American Meteorite Museum, which was first located near Meteor Crater, Arizona (1942-1953), then in Sedona, Arizona (1953–1960). In addition to his passion for meteorites, Dr. Nininger always considered himself a "naturalist," with interests and expertise in all of the natural sciences.

The present collection consists of both mounted and unmounted mineral specimens, which were self-collected or purchased by H.H. Nininger, labeled and were put on display in his home in Sedona, Arizona. This collection represents a one-of-a-kind collection of minerals assembled and displayed in the fashion of its day by a noted scientific figure.

## Very Large and Rare American Emerald—"The Carolina Queen" Hiddenite, North Carolina

This historical emerald of exceptional quality, size and provenance was found in Hiddenite, North Carolina in the fall of 1998. It is the largest faceted emerald ever found in North America and the finest and largest ever recorded.

Located in the rolling foothills of the Appalachians, the small town of Hiddenite has long been associated with a wide range of gemstones, including emerald, ruby, sapphire and the rare gem hiddenite, the type locality for that stone (the deep-green sister of the lilac-pink gem known as kunzite, named after George Frederick Kunz, gemologist and former curator of the American Museum of Natural History Mineral Collection). In the late 19th century, Thomas Edison, the inventor, asked Kunz and Professor William Hidden to visit the area to seek platinum for his light bulb filaments. The men did not find platinum, but Prof. Hidden discovered the gem that was then named after him (as was the town). Hidden and Kunz found 63 different gems and minerals in an area along a fault line in what they described as "the most complex geological zone in the world." Decades passed with few finds of any significance until, in the early 1970s, Tiffany and Co. purchased a 13-carat gem, known as "The Carolina Emerald" amid much fanfare and publicity. At the time it was believed to be the most valuable North American gem until the present stone was found in the late 90s.

It was not until the 1990s that miner James K. Hill discovered a vein yielding large, gem-quality emeralds including a 70+ carats crystal from which the present stone and another smaller one were cut. The smaller oval stone, *weighing approximately 7.85 carats*, was dubbed "The Carolina Prince". It was stated to have sold privately in 1999 for a record total of US\$500,000 or over \$63,000 per carat. The second stone, which is the present offering, was cut from that same rough, yet is of significantly greater size at 18.88 carats, and is known as "The Carolina Queen". Notable not only for its large size, the vivid color sets this stone apart from any others. The color in North Carolina emeralds results from the presence of chromium, the same coloring agent in the famed emeralds of Colombia. The color of the present emerald is comparable to very fine Colombian stones.







# Artists' Biographies and Index

Sylivia and Luis Alberto Quispe Aparicio Syliva and Luis Alberto Quispe Aparicio, follow a second-generation family tradition in the fabrication of *objets d'art*. More than 45 years ago, their father Vicente Quispe, originally a hobby mineral collector, turned professional, attended the Munich gem and mineral show and fell in love with carvings from Idar-Oberstein which he saw exhibited there. A few years later he established his own studio in Lima, Peru with the vision of becoming the top South American studio in the art of gemstone carving.

Sylvia, a goldsmith and jewelry designer who studied in Idar-Oberstein, today lives in Zurich where she designs for their studio. Her brother, Luis Alberto, trained in industrial engineering and marketing, is in charge of design work and their studio in Lima. Sylvia and Luis Albert grew up surrounded by an environment of art work, carvings, sculptures, rough stones, minerals and the artists and master carvers who continuously visited and worked at their family studio. Their own designs are inspired by wildlife and merge sculpting techniques with those of jewelry fabrication. It is their unusual design work that separates them from traditional carving from the Old Continent.

Today their studio specializes mostly in carving ruby. The second hardest stone after diamond, few artists have managed to successfully work this stone since it requires a very advanced technique for both carving and polished involving two or three times as many tools and time. Their works are displayed in museums in the United States and Europe and enjoyed by private collectors around the world.

## Nicolai Appel

## Eberhard Bank

Born on April 12, 1953, Bank's work follows in the traditions of the famous gem cutting city of Idar-Oberstein. #### Günther Bohrer

The Bohrer family has been in the stone-cutting business since 1810 originally establishing the firm under the name of 'Emil Bohrer & Son' in Siesbach, Germany (14 km from Idar-Oberstein). Devoted solely to stone cutting until 1952, they subsequently branched out into importing and selling rough stones from Brazil, in particular agate. In 1958 the company 'Gunther Bohrer' was founded and the importing of rough stones was extended to Africa, Australia and Russia. The stones are imported directly from the mines without any middlemen. Since 1968 the firm is based in Idar-Oberstein and since 1995, the son, Jurgen Bohrer, has run the firm. Lots 1173, 1177, 1178

## Gerd Dreher

Born in 1943 in Idar-Oberstein, Gerd is a fourth generation animal figure carver. Dreher's family has been involved in the art of engraving and carving gemstones for nearly two hundred years. A longestablished family tradition of producing hardstone and gem animal carvings was begun in the 19th Century and by the early 1900s their name was synonymous with that of the jeweler, Carl Fabergé. The Russian master, on his frequent trips to Idar, would provide plaster models of whimsical animal carvings, which the Dreher family would create out of jasper, agate and jade. Fabergé then sold them in his famed salons in Petersburg, Moscow and London.

Gerd is a keenly observant naturalist who maintains a massive library of videotapes of animals in motion. His devotion to realism in muscle and animation is what sets his carvings apart. In 2004 a major retrospective exhibition of 60 works entitled *The Gem Carvings* of *Gerd Dreher: A Faberge Legacy*, was held at the Houston Museum of Natural Science. In the words of Joel Bartsch, Curator of Gems and Minerals for the Museum, "Dreher's ability to breathe life into stone has made him one of the most famous practitioners of the craft in the world today. His work is a marriage of art and science." Lot 1001

## Paul Dreher

Gerd Dreher's grandfather, Herman Dreher (1876-1960) began the family tradition of excellence and much of his work was produced for and sold as, "Fabergé". Equally talented was Paul Dreher (1910-1968), Gerd's father, who continued the family's high standards. Occasionally collaborating with Georg Wild, they together produced the finest carvings available during that period. From time to time some of Paul's work has been mistakenly attributed to the house of Fabergé. He managed to gain such expertise and quality in his animal sculptures crafted after his own ideas and designs, that two of them were included in a famous book on Fabergé published in 1962 in London, in which they were presented as Fabergé's own designs. ## Patrick Dreher

A fifth generation gemstone carver, Patrick is the son of Gerd Dreher and grandson of Paul Dreher. He has now worked for 25 years in that family tradition with particular strength in the area of animal carvings. Lot 1003

#### Manfred Gettman

Manfred Gettman, owner of the firm Robert Juchem, is presently in his early 70s and is no longer carving. Now in its third generation, hand-made art objects and especially animal figures made from precious stones have been created in the *atelier* of Robert Juchem for over 60 years. Precious mineral specimens and rough imported principally from Brazil, Chile, Argentina, South Africa, Afghanistan, India and Eastern Europe are carefully selected for the natural characteristics in creating one-of-a-kind carvings. #### Heidi Nilges

Born near Idar-Oberstein in the village of Mörschied, Germany, Heidi Nilges apprenticed as a carver of precious stones in the *atelier* of her father, Erich Klos. Joining his firm after completing her studies in 1981, she continued working in the gem carving profession until 1994 and subsequently completed her diploma at the Advanced Technical College of Gemstone Carving in Idar-Oberstein. Born on August 18th, 1950 in the village of Herrstein near to Idar-Oberstein, Germany. He began his education as a gemstone carver in 1965 and finished as a Master Gemstone carver in 1973. Founding his own company in 1976, together with his wife, Edith Moser and his son Sebastian Moser, they have built a successful and prosperous carving business which still exists today. #### Peter Mueller

Peter Müller was born in 1952 near Luzern, Switzerland. Following professional training in international banking he commenced a brilliant career in that field only to later be lured by the appeal of international travel—which lead him to live in Brazil in 1979. A chance encounter with a Brazilian carver of birds in 1984 inspired him to change his life's work. He established a workshop in semi-precious stone carvings that same year.

His works are rich in unexpected beauty and surprising details. Naturally, no two carvings are identical. They are life-like reproductions of birds from the tropics and the Northern Hemisphere, hand-fabricated from natural colored precious stones from all over the world. The bases are hand-picked by Peter from several tons of rough, including Brazilian tourmalines and quartzes from eleven different mines, as well as many other rare minerals from his adopted country.

Familiar with the work of Idar-Oberstein carvers since his childhood, Peter has made annual trips there over the last twenty years to learn new carving techniques. These skills are then imparted to his crew of carvers in Brazil, now considered to be the best trained craftsmen in that country. Peter Müller's lapidary work has been the subject of a number of articles including: *Rock and Gem Magazine*, May 2000 and *Wildlife Art Magazine*, March/April 2002.

#### Andreas Roth

Born on August 7, 1973 in Idar-Oberstein, Andreas is the son of gemstone engraver Hans-Dieter Roth. He performed his apprenticeship with his father in 1993 and completed his Mastercraftman's Diploma in Gemstone Cutting and Engraving in 1999. Working in his father's firm since 1996 he established his own firm in 2008. Lot 1047

#### Dieter Roth

Born on May 3, 1948 in Idar-Oberstein, Roth entered the glyptography course (the art or process of carving or engraving on precious stones) at the Professional Training School in 1963 while working in the *atelier* of cameo master Richard H. Hahn. After finishing the course in three and a half years, he passed the Glyptography Master Examination in 1973. He carved many works in the Hahn Atelier where he remained until 1978. He subsequently established the Roth Atelier where he works to the present. His cameos feature smooth surfaces and feminine images. #### **Christopher Schmidt**

Idar-Oberstein lapidary artist, Christoph Schmitt, born in 1956, completed his apprenticeship for gemstone carving after spending four years with Robert Juchem in the German village of Niederwörresbach. He attended the renown Masterschool for Gem Carvers in Idar-Oberstein between 1992- 1994 and began working as a Master Carver in the workshop of Robert Juchem after 1994.

# **Ronald Stevens**

Originally from California, Ronald Stevens now owns his own carving *atelier* in Chiang Mai, Thailand where he directs a team of skilled craftsmen. A lapidary himself, he is also a silversmith and jewelry designer. Known especially for his utilization of rare rough material he is inspired by the stone itself allowing it to suggest the form that the eventual sculpture should take. #### Georg Wild

The name of Wild has a long history in the Idar-Oberstein lapidary field. The art of carving and engraving has been practiced in this family for over one hundred years. In 1839, one member of the family went to Paris to learn the art of cameo cutting. Another, Johann Karl Wild IX, worked in St. Petersburg as a jeweler and engraver in the Faberge workshops in Czarist Russia. Upon returning to Idar-Oberstein he founded his own enterprise from which sprang the firm of Georg O. Wild.

Georg O. Wild was born in Idar-Oberstein on January 22, 1894. Inheriting his father's talent for engraving, cameo cutting and carving stones he started his own firm in 1921. Large numbers of his sculptures are now exhibited in the Idar-Oberstein museum and in various museums across the United States. Not only was he a gemstone carver, his gemological knowledge was equally considerable. He founded the German Gemological Association in 1932 and around the same time established the *Gewerbehalle*, *Edelstein Institut* today part of the University of Mainz, Germany's equivalent of the Gemological Institute. In the United States he became particularly wellknown for creating reproductions of Audubon birds in semi-precious stones. In France he executed some commissions in behalf of artist Georges Braque. Much of the carving of his animal figures was done by Wild himself, others by his assistants working in his atelier directly under his guidance. He died on November 23, 1975 at the age of 81. His business is now continued by his son, Klaus Eberhard Wild and by Manfred Weichel, his collaborator during his final years. ## Manfred Wild

Born in 1944, Manfred Wild, an eighth-generation gem cutter, is one of the most renowned lapidary artists to emerge from Idar-Oberstein. At the age of twenty, during an apprenticeship with a gemstone merchant, he began his well-rounded educational journey in the areas of fine art, gemstone cutting, engraving and goldsmithing.

Working in a family tradition of stone cutters established in 1630, Manfred Wild is one of the world's most famous creators of "objets d'art." He is best known for his virtuoso work in rare, precious and semiprecious materials carved as perfume bottles, animals, whimsical figures, flower studies, enameled eggs with concealed "surprises", cameos, chalices and objets de fantaisie made of precious stones, gold and silver.

It is helpful, of course, to understand Wild's work within the greater context of 19th and 20th Century Decorative and Jewelry Arts. In addition to the influence of his own family and town, Mr. Wild follows the traditions established by René Lalique and Peter Carl Fabergé (Russian jeweler, 1846-1920) and a great number of parallels can be seen in their work. Fabergé had begun a new era in the Jewelry Arts. Prior to him, many jewelers felt the value of jewelry was intrinsic, based upon the stones (particularly diamonds) and precious metals. The artistic creativity and superior craftsmanship introduced by Fabergé made such objects transcend their "break value". Fabergé also used a number of decorative techniques attributable to French 18th Century goldsmiths, e.g. the art of guilloché, a surface treatment of metal that could make waved lines or striations in the design, either performed by machine or by hand. Atop the quilloché decoration was a translucent enameling that required the application of several coats and the "firing" of the object in an oven after each layer, a very labor-intensive technique. The limited palette of enamels used in the nineteenth century was expanded upon by Fabergé who, after much experimentation, arrived at over 140 shades. He also used natural stones often found in his local area or native to Russia, e.g. jasper, agate, bowenite, nephrite. Often his use of precious stones, including sapphires, rubies and emeralds was in an understated way, only for accents, and even then were used en cabochon. Diamonds, if used, were typically rose-cut. So many of the aforementioned decorative elements are seen the work of Wild even as they appear in the examples on these pages. When India Early Minshall, a wealthy collector of Fabergé purchased an egg in 1944, she stated, "Fabergé was called the Benvenuto Cellini of the North, but I do not think any jeweler can ever be compared to him"-She could not know that someday the work of Manfred Wild would rival the work of the great Russian jeweler.....

Mr. Wild's works are displayed in museums throughout the world including: The German Gemstone Museum in Idar-Oberstein, The Smithsonian Institution in Washington, D.C., The Harvard Museum in Boston, The Carnegie Museum in Pittsburgh and The Iksan Jewellery Museum in Korea, as well as extensive private collections in Japan, Europe, the Middle East, and the United States of America.

#### Helmut Wolf

A third generation carver, Helmut Wolf learned his trade at the famous gemstone carving institute of Idar-Oberstein. Wolf set up his own atelier at the age of 28. His training in forming gem vessels was of the highest level. His work comprises items having matte and polished surfaces, cut extremely thin, with the crust left in its natural shape or the host mineral specifically emphasized. These characteristics render his work unique and display a sensitive understanding of the minerals. His work has won him various prizes across Germany. Helmut states "the road leading to an artistically formed vessel is an arduous one"—many of his bowls are so thin that they ring with the clear tone of a bell that fills the room. #### Alfred Zimmerman

One of the most renowned lapidary artists of the last several decades, Zimmerman is a member of an Idar-Oberstein family of gemstone carvers. Originally an apprentice of Gerd Dreher, Alfred Zimmerman is also known for working in the "Fabergé" tradition. Zimmerman's frequent subjects are either soldiers or peasants in folkloric attire but he is well known for animal carvings of transparent crystalline minerals. Lots 1033, 1034, 1035, 1036, 1037

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
