CONDITIONS OF SALE

The following Conditions of Sale, as amended by any published or posted notices or verbal announcements during the sale, constitute the entire terms and conditions on which property listed in the catalog shall be offered for sale or sold by Bonhams & Butterfields Auctioneers Corp. and any consignor of such property for whom we act as agent. If live online bidding is available for the subject auction, additional terms and conditions of sale relating to online bidding will apply; see <u>www.bonhams.com/WebTerms</u> for the supplemental terms. As used herein, "Bonhams," "we" and "us" refer to Bonhams & Butterfields Auctioneers Corp.

1. As used herein, the term "bid price" means the price at which a lot is successfully knocked down to the purchaser. The term "purchase price" means the aggregate of (a) the bid price, (b) a PREMIUM retained by us and payable by the purchaser EQUAL TO 25% OF THE FIRST \$100,000 OF THE BID PRICE, 20% OF THE AMOUNT OF THE BID PRICE ABOVE \$100,000 UP TO AND INCLUDING \$2,000,000, AND 12% OF THE AMOUNT OF THE BID PRICE OVER \$2,000,000, and (c) unless the purchaser is exempt by law from the payment thereof, any California, Arizona, Colorado, Connecticut, Florida, Georgia, Illinois, Massachusetts, Nevada, New York, Pennsylvania, Texas, Washington, D.C., Washington state, or other state or local sales tax (or compensating use tax) and other applicable taxes.

2. On the fall of the auctioneer's hammer, the highest bidder shall have purchased the offered lot in accordance and subject to compliance with all of the conditions set forth herein and (a) assumes full risk and responsibility therefor, (b) if requested will sign a confirmation of purchase, and (c) will pay the purchase price in full or such part as we may require for all lots purchased. No lot may be transferred. Any person placing a bid as agent on behalf of another (whether or not such person has disclosed that fact or the identity of the principal may be jointly and severally liable with the principal under any contract resulting from the acceptance of a bid.

Unless otherwise agreed, payment in good funds is due and payable within five (5) business days following the auction sale. Whenever the purchaser pays only a part of the total purchase price for one or more lots purchased, we may apply such payments, in our sole discretion, to the lot or lots we choose. Payment will not be deemed made in full until we have collected good funds for all amounts due.

Payment for purchases may be made in or by (a) cash, (b) cashier's check or money order, (c) personal check with approved credit drawn on a U.S. bank, (d) wire transfer or other immediate bank transfer, or (e) Visa, MasterCard, American Express or Discover credit, charge or debit card. A processing fee will be assessed on any returned checks. Please note that the amount of cash notes and cash equivalents that can be accepted from a given purchaser may be limited.

The purchaser grants us a security interest in the property, and we may retain as collateral security for the purchaser's obligations to us, any property and all monies held or received by us for the account of the purchaser, in our possession. We retain all rights of a secured party under the California Commercial Code. If the foregoing conditions or any other applicable conditions herein are not complied with, in addition to other remedies available to us and the consignor by law, including without limitation, the right to hold the purchaser liable for the purchase price, we at our option may either (a) cancel the sale, retaining as liquidated damages all payments made by the purchaser or (b) resell the property, either publicly or privately, and in such event the purchaser shall be liable for the payment of any deficiency plus all costs and expenses of both

sales, our commission at our standard rates, all other charges due hereunder, attorneys' fees, expenses and incidental damages. In addition, where two or more amounts are owed in respect of different transactions by the purchaser to us, to Bonhams 1793 Limited and/ or to any of our other affiliates, subsidiaries or parent companies worldwide within the Bonhams Group, we reserve the right to apply any monies paid in respect of a transaction to discharge any amount owed by the purchaser. If all fees, commissions, premiums, bid price and other sums due to us from the purchaser are not paid promptly as provided in these Conditions of Sale, we reserve the right to impose a finance charge equal to 1.5% per month on all amounts due to us beginning on the 31st day following the sale until payment is received, in addition to other remedies available to us by law.

3. We reserve the right to withdraw any property and to divide and combine lots at any time before such property's auction. Unless otherwise announced by the auctioneer at the time of sale, all bids are per lot as numbered in the catalog and no lots shall be divided or combined for sale.

4. We reserve the right to reject a bid from any bidder, to split any bidding increment, and to advance the bidding in any manner the auctioneer may decide. In the event of any dispute between bidders, or in the event the auctioneer doubts the validity of any bid, the auctioneer shall have sole and final discretion either to determine the successful bidder or to re-offer and resell the article in dispute. If any dispute arises after the sale, our sales records shall be conclusive in all respects.

5. If we are prevented by fire, theft or any other reason whatsoever from delivering any property to the purchaser or a sale otherwise cannot be completed, our liability shall be limited to the sum actually paid therefor by the purchaser and shall in no event include any compensatory, incidental or consequential damages.

6. If a lot is offered subject to a reserve, we may implement such reserve by bidding on behalf of the consignor, whether by opening bidding or continuing bidding in response to other bidders until reaching the reserve. If we have an interest in an offered lot and the proceeds thereform other than our commissions, we may bid therefor to protect such interest. CONSIGNORS ARE NOT ALLOWED TO BID ON THEIR OWN ITEMS.

7. All statements contained in the catalog or in any bill of sale, condition report, invoice or elsewhere as to authorship, period, culture, source, origin, measurement, quality, rarity, provenance, importance, exhibition and literature of historical relevance, or physical condition ARE QUALIFIED STATEMENTS OF OPINION AND NOT REPRESENTATIONS OR WARRANTIES. No employee or agent of Bonhams is authorized to make on our behalf or on that of the consignor any representation or warranty, oral or written, with respect to any property.

8. All purchased property shall be removed from the premises at which the sale is conducted by the date(s) and time(s) set forth in the "Buyer's Guide" portion of this catalog. Property designated with a "W" and associated purchased lots, if not removed promptly following sale, will be transferred to an offsite warehouse at the purchaser's risk and expense, as set forth in more detail in the "Buyer's Guide." Purchased property that is permitted to remain onsite at Bonhams' facility should be removed at the purchaser's expense not later than 5:00 p.m. Pacific Time five (5) business days following the date of the sale. If not so removed, a storage fee of \$5.00 per lot per day will be payable to us by the purchaser beginning at the close of the 21st day following the sale, and we may thereafter transfer such property to an offsite warehouse at the purchaser's risk and expense. Accounts must be settled in full before property will be released. Packing and handling of purchased lots are the responsibility of the purchaser. Bonhams can provide packing and shipping services for certain items as noted in the "Buyer's Guide" section of the catalog.

9. The copyright in the text of the catalog and the photographs, digital images and illustrations of lots in the catalog belong to Bonhams or its licensors. You will not reproduce or permit anyone else to reproduce such text, photographs, digital images or illustrations without our prior written consent.

10. These Conditions of Sale shall bind the successors and assigns of all bidders and purchasers and inure to the benefit of our successors and assigns. No waiver, amendment or modification of the terms hereof (other than posted notices or oral announcements during the sale) shall bind us unless specifically stated in writing and signed by us. If any part of these Conditions of Sale is for any reason invalid or unenforceable, the rest shall remain valid and enforceable.

11. These Conditions of Sale and the purchaser's and our respective rights and obligations hereunder are governed by the laws of the State of California. By bidding at an auction, each purchaser and bidder agrees to be bound by these Conditions of Sale. Any dispute, controversy or claim arising out of or relating to this agreement, or the breach, termination or validity thereof, brought by or against Bonhams (but not including claims brought against the consignor by the purchaser of lots consigned hereunder) shall be resolved by the procedures set forth below.

Mediation and Arbitration Procedures

(a) Within 30 days of written notice that there is a dispute, the parties or their authorized and empowered representatives shall meet by telephone and/or in person to mediate their differences. If the parties agree, a mutually acceptable mediator shall be selected and the parties will equally share such mediator's fees. The mediator shall be a retired judge or an attorney familiar with commercial law and trained in or qualified by experience in handling mediations. Any communications made during the mediation process shall not be admissible in any subsequent arbitration, mediation or judicial proceeding. All proceedings and any resolutions thereof shall be confidential, and the terms governing arbitration set forth in paragraph (c) below shall govern.

(b) If mediation does not resolve all disputes between the parties, or in any event no longer than 60 days after receipt of the written notice of dispute referred to above, the parties shall submit the dispute for binding arbitration before a single neutral arbitrator. Such arbitrator shall be a retired judge or an attorney familiar with commercial law and trained in or qualified by experience in handling arbitrations. Such arbitrator shall make all appropriate disclosures required by law. The arbitrator shall be drawn from a panel of a national arbitration service agreed to by the parties, and shall be selected as follows: (i) If the national arbitration service has specific rules or procedures, those rules or procedures shall be followed; (ii) If the national arbitration service does not have rules or procedures for the selection of an arbitrator, the arbitrator shall be an individual jointly agreed to by the parties. If the parties cannot agree on a national arbitration service, the arbitration shall be conducted by the American Arbitration Association, and the arbitrator shall be selected in accordance with the Rules of the American Arbitration Association. The arbitrator's award shall be in writing and shall set forth findings of fact and legal conclusions.

CONDITIONS OF SALE - CONTINUED

(c) Unless otherwise agreed to by the parties or provided by the published rules of the national arbitration service:

(i) the arbitration shall occur within 60 days following the selection of the arbitrator;

(ii) the arbitration shall be conducted in the designated location, as follows: (A) in any case in which the subject auction by Bonhams took place or was scheduled to take place in the State of New York or Connecticut or the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, the arbitration shall take place in New York City, New York; (B) in all other cases, the arbitration shall take place in the city of San Francisco, California; and

(iii) discovery and the procedure for the arbitration shall be as follows:

(A) All arbitration proceedings shall be confidential;

(B) The parties shall submit written briefs to the arbitrator no later than 15 days before the arbitration commences;

(C) Discovery, if any, shall be limited as follows: (I) Requests for no more than 10 categories of documents, to be provided to the requesting party within 14 days of written request therefor; (II) No more than two (2) depositions per party, provided however, the deposition(s) are to be completed within one (1) day; (III) Compliance with the above shall be enforced by the arbitrator in accordance with California law;

(D) Each party shall have no longer than eight (8) hours to present its position. The entire hearing before the arbitrator shall not take longer than three (3) consecutive days;

(E) The award shall be made in writing no more than 30 days following the end of the proceeding. Judgment upon the award rendered by the arbitrator may be entered by any court having jurisdiction thereof.

To the fullest extent permitted by law, and except as required by applicable arbitration rules, each party shall bear its own attorneys' fees and costs in connection with the proceedings and shall share equally the fees and expenses of the arbitrator.

Limited Right of Rescission

If within one (1) year from the date of sale, the original purchaser (a) gives written notice to us alleging that the identification of Authorship (as defined below) of such lot as set forth in the BOLD TYPE heading of the catalog description of such lot (as amended by any saleroom notices or verbal announcements during the sale) is not substantially correct based on a fair reading of the catalog (including the terms of any glossary contained therein), and (b) within 10 days after such notice returns the lot to us in the same condition as at the time of sale, and (c) establishes the allegation in the notice to our satisfaction (including by providing one or more written opinions by recognized experts in the field, as we may reasonably require), then the sale of such lot will be rescinded and, unless we have already paid to the consignor monies owed him in connection with the sale, the original purchase price will be refunded.

If, prior to receiving such notice from the original purchaser alleging such defect, we have paid the consignor monies owed him in connection with the sale, we shall pay the original purchaser the amount of our commissions, any other sale proceeds to which we are entitled and applicable taxes received from the purchaser on the sale and make demand on the consignor to pay the balance of the original purchase price to the original purchaser. Should the consignor fail to pay such amount promptly, we may disclose the identity of the consignor and assign to the original purchaser our rights against the consignor with respect to the lot the sale of which is sought to be rescinded. Upon such disclosure and assignment, any liability of Bonhams as consignor's agent with respect to said lot shall automatically terminate.

The foregoing limited right of rescission is available to the original purchaser only and may not be assigned to or relied upon by any subsequent transferee of the property sold. Before each auction we publish illustrated catalogs that include dates and times for previews and auctions. Our catalogs also provide descriptions and estimated values for each "lot." A lot may refer to a single item or to a group of items auctioned together. We offer our catalogs by subscription or by single copy. For information on subscribing to our catalogs, you may refer to the subscription form in this catalog, call our Client Services Department, or visit our website at www.bonhams.com/us.

Previews

Auction previews are your chance to inspect each lot prior to the auction. 

Foreword

As the rare book community descends upon Southern California, Bonhams is pleased to present this small but tasteful sale of fine books and manuscripts. We preview in San Francisco January 31-February 2, coinciding with the 2014 San Francisco Antiquarian Book, Print & Paper Fair (this year taking place at the Ft. Mason concourse, a new venue for them). From there, we are bringing the material back to our Los Angeles galleries for a preview that coincides with the California ABAA Fair in Pasadena, February 7-9.

The present sale opens with a strong selection of ornithological titles, including the Lockwood octavo edition of Audubon's *Birds of America* (\$15/20,000), John Gould's *A Monograph of the Trogonidae...* (\$16/18,000), Mathews' *The Birds of Australia* and *The Birds of Norfolk* (\$15/25,000) and Rothchilds' *The Avifauna of Laysan and the Neighboring Islands* (\$15/25,000), one of the first and most important books on Hawaiian birds. This section, which nearly all originates from the same source, also includes some handsome original artwork, including a Louis Agassiz Fuertes watercolor of Germain's Peacock Pheasant and Pea Hen and Charles Robert Knight's oil of three Lady Amherst's Pheasants (both \$4/6,000).

Following Ornithology is our Natural History and Science section, which offers many complimentary scientific plate books, such as Beechey's *Voyage*, Robert Hooke's *Micrographia*, and Redouté's *Les Roses*; following that is our Travel section, which continues the dialogue with Cook's *Voyages* and Kaempfer's *History of Japan*.

At the half point of our sale we are offering a selection of vintage photographic images of China taken between 1910 and 1929 by John Zumbrun, an American businessman and the owner of the Camera Craft studio in Peking. For more about this remarkable collection, see the introduction written by Norman Hodgson on p 38 of this catalog.

Some other sale highlights include an excellent copy of Foujita's A Book of Cats (\$60/80,000) and a very rare and beautiful set of Hamilton and D'Hancarville's *Collection of Etruscan, Greek, and Roman Antiquities from the Cabinet of the Hon. W. Hamilton* (\$75/100,000). This last title is almost unknown in the full four volumes, and certainly not in a contemporary binding.

The sale closes with small but interesting sections of Literature and Philosophy, including the first collaboration of Marx and Engels and a fine copy of Hume's *Treatise of Human Nature*. There follows some excellent examples of Western Americana, including George Bonnell's *Topographical Description of Texas* (1840) and Leonard Kip's *California Sketches*.... (1850), the former being the first Texan book on Texas and the latter an important account of Gold Rush-era California.

Since so many of our clients will be in California for the fairs, we are also making future sale highlights available to view. In San Francisco we will be exhibiting highlights from *Treasures from The Caren Archive: How History Unfolds on Paper* at the Fort Mason Book and Paper Fair. The Caren Archive auction will be on April 7, in New York. In Los Angeles, our esteemed London colleague Matthew Haley will be in our Sunset Blvd galleries, exhibiting highlights from his upcoming sale, Law Books: Property of LA Law Library, a collection of continental law books that will be sold in London on March 5, 2014. Matthew will host a brunch in our Los Angeles galleries on Sunday, February 9 at 10 am to showcase the highlights and discuss the collection. Those interested in attending should email events.us@bonhams.com.

Finally, we are holding extended preview hours in Los Angeles to accommodate fairgoers, opening 10-5 Thursday the 6th through Sunday the 9th. A map from the Pasadena fair to Bonhams' Los Angeles office is found on the preceding page. The sale will be held Monday the 10th at 10am, simulcast between Los Angeles and San Francisco. With only 171 lots, we should be through by lunchtime.

The Camera Craft Collection: Photographic Images of Old China by John David Zumbrun

John David Zumbrun was born in 1875 in Hanover, New York and little was known of him until he enlisted in the army for a tour of duty in the Spanish American War serving in the Philippines (Manila) as a hospital corpsman. Sometime around 1910 he arrived in Peking and became owner of the very popular photographic studio Camera Craft. Zumbrun was an agent of Eastman Kodak and is credited with introducing the process for autochromes into Peking. Zumbrun became very successful as a photographer and business owner. His adventurous personality provided him access to all strata of life in China, and to all sectors of the community.

His collection of photos includes images of the Imperial Court and the Last Emperor Puyi, Dr. Sun Yat Sen, General Yuan Shikai, warlords, ambassadors, officers, shopkeepers, craftsmen, farmers, peasants and refugees. He was witness to the events of the day: the revolution of 1911, the Student Revolution of 1919, and life in the city and the countryside. Zumbrun's shop was one of two photographic studios in Peking and soon became an essential stop for Western tourists and travelers for two decades, and a fixture of regular life amongst the European quarters of the city. G.E. Morrison, *The Times* correspondent to Peking, was a regular visitor.

A more detailed account of his coverage of life in and around Peking is well covered in the travelogs and brochures of the Thomas Cook & Sons travel agency: "Information for Travelers Visiting Peking" and "Peking and the Overland Route." As the political situation deteriorated in the late 1920s, Zumbrun decided to leave China with his collection, wife and 2 daughters in 1929. He closed up shop and took down the Camera Craft sign. He packed the essence of his work into 3 steamer trunks constructed according to his specifications and set sail from China on the *Koto Maru*. First stop was Japan, then Hawaii, and finally he arrived in San Francisco, eventually settling across the bay in Oakland, California where he lived until 1949, the year of his death.

The trunks lay undisturbed until September of 2009, when they were opened for the first time in 80 years. In his lifetime some of Zumbrun's photography was featured in National Geographic in the 1920s and other pre-war publications written by visitors to the city. Unlike Thomson and other great photographers of the 19th century, Zumbrun worked locally and was not widely dispersed or known outside of the Peking set, and his work is very rarely seen, and barely recognized in photographic circles. This selection is a taste of the achievements of this accomplished photographer, and even more so, a rare glimpse into the life of Old China at the beginning of the 20th century. This period of Chinese history is inadequately recorded in photographs, particularly as the turbulence of the country discouraged visitors. I very much hope that these images will redress the balance and that Zumbrun will be appreciated as the truly great observer and chronicler of Chinese life that he was.

Offisa Pupp hears a moaning lament from somewhere in the distance and rushes over to find Krazy Kat singing the blues: "*My poo' sad hott is breakin' an' all my corns is wile ... my kittil of soup is werra dry, my kendil has gone out,*" etc, reducing Offissa Pup to sobbing pleas to cease. Out of the Coconino landscape appears Ignatz, zipping a brick at Krazy's head just as Offissa rushes off. In the next panel Offissa encounters Mock Duck, and asks "*I-I-I said- do you hear what I hear?*" The freshly clobbered Krazy's tune has changed, amidst a cloud of dust and rising hearts: "*There is a heppy lend fur, fur away.*"





VERY RARE AND ENIGMATIC BYRON PAMPHLET, we find record of only this copy and one owned by Alfred H. Huth (possibly the same copy). The first leaf bears a watermark of 1833.

Wise's letter, dated April 19, 1921 reads in full: "With regard to Forman's copy of "Lines to a Beautiful Quaker," this was acquired by Forman many years ago. I think I have told you before,— if not it may interest you to be told now,— that the leaflet was found by Forman in a bound volume of collected Byron pieces. He took it out of this volume, & always intended to let Riviere bind it. Meanwhile it lived in an envelope slipped between the row of Byron pamphlets. I fear the Revenue people, when they examined the library with the other contents of the house for the purpose of fixing the Death-Duty, must have taken the envelope to be empty & have tossed it into the fire or into the waste paper basket, for when afterwards I went over the books & MSS. I could not find it. I hunted everywhere for it, and so did Mrs Forman so far as she was able [she is a cripple, & moves only in a wheeled chair], but without success. The moral is, always bind or case these waifs without a day's delay!"

Thomas J. Wise and Harry Buxton Forman are the two most notorious forgers in recent bibliophilic history. Wise, however, is not known or seriously suspected of having ever forged Byron and the late date of the watermark is uncharacteristic. Despite the very suspicious presence of Wise's letter citing Forman as provenance, this could be a legitimate circa 1833 printing. Or, more tantalizingly, it is just possible that this is an early forgery by Buxton Forman, pre-dating his association with Wise. John Collins pointed out that Forman once forged a book by Richard Horne which also used late watermarked paper. And although Spoor makes no record of how he acquired this copy, it seems likely that it is the Forman copy, pilfered by Wise from Forman's widow. 

FIRST EDITION, VERY RARE: CALVIN'S CONDEMNATION OF ASTROLOGY. "[This work] shows that Calvin was much in advance of his age on such points, when some of the most enlightened minds were not free from that superstition. Melancthon, in particular, was a slave to it. What rendered it more difficult for Calvin to refute this pretended science was, that he was unacquainted with the true system of the universe. Though the work of Copernicus was written in 1530, it was some years before it became known ... [and] Calvin still considers the heavens as turning round the earth. This erroneous system favoured astrology, inasmuch as it made the heavens appear only subsidiary to the earth; and thus occasioned a difficulty which Calvin found it hard to meet" (Dyer, *Life of John Calvin*, 1850). FIRST COMPLETE, FRENCH EDITION, preceded by only the expurgated German edition and the excerpts which appeared in *Urania*. The memoirs were edited for this edition by Jean Laforgue who had access to the entire original manuscript.

At Casanova's death, his unfinished manuscript memoirs (they cover his life until 1774) passed to a literary agent, but the outbreak of the Napoleonic Wars prevented its publication until 1822, when it was acquired by Brockhaus. Its first appearance was thus in German translated "extracts." This incomplete and censored edition was then pirated by a French publisher, Tournachon, who had no choice but to re-translate the German text into French (1825-9). The present edition is the first of the original French text. When Laforgue returned the manuscript to the publisher, he inexplicably failed to return four chapters, which remain lost to this day. Laforgue's edition is thus the only surviving witness to these chapters and has been preferred to this day for that reason. Casanova's Mémoires were soon banned, and the publishing history of the present edition illustrates the scandalousness of its contents. The first 4 volumes were printed in Leipzig until the authorities forbade it; the next 4 volumes bear a Paris imprint; and the final 4 volumes were apparently published in Brussels, but with no publisher indicated. \$3,000 - 5,000







Zborowski was embedded with the Trotskyists in Paris and is thought to have a hand in the deaths of both Trotsky and his son Lev Sedov. As an anthropologist, he co-authored *Life is with People*, a study of Jewish life in the shtetls of Eastern Europe before WWII.

FIRST EDITION OF MARX AND ENGELS' FIRST COLLABORATION. Marx and Engels began their lifelong friendship in the summer of 1844 while Engels was visiting Paris. The two decided to collaborate on a critique of the intellectual trend of the day, the Young Hegelians. The book received a fair amount of newspaper coverage, some drawing attention to its socialist views and one conservative newspaper wrote that "every line preaches revolt... against the state, the church, the family, legality, religion and property." The book itself is a great rarity, and we can find no examples in the auction records.



FIRST EDITION OF A SEMINAL TEXT OF ENLIGHTENMENT PHILOSOPHY. Published anonymously and at first garnering little critical attention–inducing in the author an apologetic and somewhat ambivalent stance towards the work throughout his lifetime–Hume's treatise was not much later recognized as a work of major significance. It remains a cornerstone of Western thought. Proceeding from the positions of Locke and Berkeley, Hume develops a theory of knowledge and experience which rejects the distinction of right and wrong as a matter of reason, at the same time asserting the supremacy of a strong moral sense. "In the *Treatise* ... we have the first attempt to apply Locke's empirical psychology to build a theory of knowledge, and from it to provide a critique of metaphysical ideas ... Hume decisively sums up a century of speculation on knowledge and of theological discussion. Though universally hailed at the time, the full importance of his conclusions was hardly appreciated until Bentham realized Hume's utilitarianism and Mill his logic" (*PMM*). A third volume was issued in 1740 by a different publisher, which Hume–conscious of the relative quiet surrounding the first two volumes–urged his readers to consider separately. It is not uncommon to find the first two volumes without the third, as here.

VERY RARE FIRST EDITION IN ENGLISH OF BOTH THE FIRST AND SECOND ROSICRUCIAN MANIFESTOS, OWNED BY THE TWO FOUNDERS OF THE ROSICRUCIAN SOCIETY IN ENGLAND.

The Rosicrucian manifestos circulated in manuscript for generations but did not appear in any printed edition until 1614. This English translation (from the German) may in fact derive from a Scots dialect manuscript. In any case, Rosicrucian philosophy and natural magic found fertile ground in England. Early adherents included Robert Boyle and Christopher Wren, whose involvement led to the genesis of the Royal Society.

The Societas Rosicruciana in Anglia was formed by Robert Wentworth Little in around 1865. According to information provided by the consignor, the book was also owned by George Winslow Plummer (1876-1944), the Imperator and Supreme Magus of the Societas Rosicruciana in America from 1909 to 1944. 



When ad executive Robert Weintraub sent out a request to one hundred well-known people asking for their favorite cookie story – as part of a PR campaign for Nabisco – the present letter from Saroyan was one of the few responses he received. In the letter, Saroyan relates a roughly 550 word story from his childhood in Fresno, about a local Finnish baker known for having a barrel of broken or stale cookies from which customers were invited to take for free. One day Saroyan's friend Eddie Emerian informs him that the baker is giving away the whole barrel to whoever wants it. Though he resolves to take it home himself, Saroyan misses his chance; shortly after he has the first of what becomes a frequently recurring dream about getting the barrel home. Saroyan reflects at the story's end: "The Finn baker retired, the bakery disappeared, the dream of the free barrel of cookies is still alive, even though I long ago knew that Eddie Emerian had invented the whole story, for he himself told me so before either of us became eleven years old. What does this mean? It means that art and cookies, imagination and longing, comedy and appetite, the real and the unreal are so closely related as to be virtually indistinguishable one from the other." The main literary work of the Pre-Raphaelite and Symbolist painter Solomon, A Vision of Love Revealed in Sleep is a prose-poem allegory utilizing themes from Jewish and Christian mysticism to express erotic desire between males as aesthetically and morally acceptable. In recent decades it has come to be recognized as a pioneering work in the annals of gay literature. Swinburne wrote a favorable review of A Vision for Dark Blue Magazine in 1871. Solomon's association with Dante Gabriel Rossetti and Edward Burne-Jones. as well as his friendships with prominent gay Victorians such as Walter Pater, Oscar Browning, George Powell, and Lord Houghton, were instrumental to his development as an artist. However, it was his intimate partnership with the pre-eminent Symbolist poet and critic Swinburne which proved essential. "The friendship between Simeon Solomon and Algernon Charles Swinburne, which lasted approximately ten years, produced some of the most aesthetically innovative and morally daring work of the 1860s and early 1870s. Both men were engaged in the production of revisionary masculine discourses which pushed the boundaries of the Victorian norm of heterosexual manliness by exploring alternative forms of desire and love between men, and by celebrating these in art, poetry, prose and criticism" (Morgan, Outlooks: Lesbian and Gay Sexualities and Visual Cultures p 62). Swinburne and many other of Solomon's friends distanced themselves following Solomon's arrest in 1873 for indecent behavior in a public lavatory, which proved ruinous to his career.

FIRST EDITION OF THE EARLIEST TEXAN BOOK ON TEXAS, A LEGENDARY RARITY, second issue with correct spelling of "Arkansas" in the index. George Bonnell was an important figure in early Texas history. He traveled to Texas in 1836 with a company of Mississippi volunteers recruited for the Texas War of Independence. He served as Sam Houston's commissioner of Indian Affairs, and was appointed a government printer in 1839, starting the first Austin Texas Sentinel. He was killed in 1842 on the Mier expedition, the most disastrous of the expeditions from Texas into Mexico during the days of the Republic.

Bonnell's deep love of Texas is exuded from nearly every page, as he states in his preface: "I have endeavored to present the country to the reader precisely as it is at the present time. But I am aware that our rapidly increasing population produces important changes at the end of nearly every month; and a section of country that is wild and uninhabited may, at the end of two or three months, be filled with a dense population ... I design publishing an enlarged edition in the course of next winter or spring ... when I hope to be able to present a volume more worthy of the beautiful country it describes." Bonnell's plans for a second edition of course were forever precluded by his untimely death. However, this plain and somewhat inexpertly printed volume is more fitting to his frontier subject. An extensive correspondence between a young Union soldier and his sister. Lowell C. Cook was born in Mendon, MA in 1838. As a young man he attended the Wilbraham Academy in that town, then enlisted in the Army in June of 1861, joining the Second Regiment of Company I, Rhode Island Volunteers. He wrote letters to his sister nearly every week, during which period he saw service at the First Battle of Bull Run, Gettysburg, and Spotsylvania (Wilderness). At the last, he was shot through the shoulder and mustered out, re-enlisting in 1865 in Company B, First Regiment, Hancock Veteran Reserve Corps.

The correspondence opens with a description of the battle and town at Sharpsburg: "we had a chance to view the battleground unmolested, it was an awful sight you may well believe, every house in the village of Sharpsburg is riddled with shot and shell, one building close by where the hottest of the fight was completely torn to pieces, the fields, roads, cornfields for miles are scattered over with dead men and horses" (September 23, 1862). In an 1863 letter, Cook describes his days picketing on the Rappahanock River, chatting with CSA pickets on the other shore until stopped by their officers.

More than the battle content-which is quite extensive, covering Bull Run, Gettysburg, and Spotsylvania-the archive also gives a vivid detail of everyday military life during the war. Cook describes the tedious process of marching from one camp to the next: "We left camp at nine o-clock and marched off in the direction of Culpepper, passed through there at half past eleven and at one in the afternoon passed the extreme outposts of the picket line ... The next morning we started again at about the same hour as the day before and kept on till after noon when we crossed Robinsons River and proceeded about a mile further and stopped. This was as far as we went, within two miles of Madison Court House" (March 4, 1864). He also tells us about the world that subsists at the edge of the military: "You may not be surprised any time to hear that this little army of the Potomac is on the tramp. Sutlers, Peddlers, Photographers and all hangers on of the army have left, cleared out vesterday or nearly all, according to orders from Mr Grant. I am glad they are gone take it all around though a little butter to eat on bread does not go very bad. but they had got to bringing any quantity of whiskey into the army and drunkenness had become too common, there is not a day now that passes without there being a great many of the men drunk as fools. The price they pay is three dollars a canteen or a dollar pint, pretty high price for the poison, aint it" (April 17, 1864)? And, not surprisingly, since Cook is still a relatively young man, he gleefully gives his poor sister the scatological lowdown, reporting on the intestinal distress he suffers after several large meals of beans and sheepishly reporting that he is punished for defecating outside of the latrine area. \$8,000 - 10,000





Justice Holmes pens a letter to the object of his affection, Lady Clare Castletown ("My Dear Hibernia"), about a shipment of pink and blue pond lily roots he is having sent to her as a gift. Displaying shades of his poet-father, he goes on to wax lyrical about another botanical specimen: "There is a very handsome pink marshmallow that grows wild on the south shore of Mass. I wonder if you would care for that if it can be got? I remember once, when life seemed at a low ebb, driving over a dreary sandy waste and suddenly coming on a lonely pool, with woods on one side, a dead tree hovering over it with the appropriate crow. And on the other side a wilderness of pink flowers standing about as high as my breast, I should think. And I felt that the romantic could be found almost anywhere after that."

Holmes was introduced to Lady Clare while traveling through England in the summer of 1889; a mutual infatuation ensued, and thereafter began a correspondence — punctuated with occasional visits — which lasted until Lady Clare's death in 1926. In an effort to keep the relationship a secret — both Holmes and Lady Clare were married — Holmes destroyed most of her letters, but Lady Clare did not follow suit, and many of Holmes' letters to her survive. They reveal an intimate relationship the exact nature of which remains a tantalizing mystery, but which, in the opinion of Holmes biographers White and Minor, constituted "Holmes' greatest romance."
