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DIRECTOR'S FOREWORD

It's a pleasure to be able to stage our February sale in Pasadena, timed to coincide with the 51st California ABAA Book Fair. For this sale, we've gathered together property that we feel will be of special interest to fairgoers and members of the book trade, from early printed material and scientific imprints to works of Americana, travel, art and literature.

The sale opens with a selection of early printed material from the library of James "Ted" Watkins. (Other titles from Ted's collection appear in later sections of the sale, particularly in our Americana and Literature sections.) Ted's collecting was informed by his faith and his interest in the history of the Catholic Church. His library includes rare incunables of canon law and important theological tracts; books and manuscripts of Catholic writers such as Flannery O'Conner, whose faith was so central to her literary vision. Read more about Ted and his collection on p 4, and check out his books on the pages following.

In our Science and Technology section, we offer a wide variety of property, from an early alchemical manuscript to an excerpt from Isaac Newton's manuscript on prophecy to a remarkable archive of correspondence between Werner Heisenberg and Bruno Rossi. The section closes with a fine example of a 3-rotor German Enigma I Enciphering Machine.

Our Americana section is anchored by important manuscripts relating to New Spain conquistador Hernando Cortes and his heirs, (many of whom were viceroys in New Spain); a Peter Force *Declaration of Independence*; a second volume in original boards of a first edition of *The Federalist Papers*; the first English edition of Lewis and Clark's *Travels to the Source of the Missouri River...*; and a manuscript page from Webster's dictionary.

We're pleased to offer some gorgeous illustrated works in our History, Travel, and Plate Books section. Highlights include a fine copy of Ackermann's *Microcosm of London*; an atlas volume of Cook's third voyage; a Homann Atlas of 1747; a delightful collection of 19th century mountaineering books from the library of John Newton; and a folio edition of David Roberts' *The Holy Land....*

We've saved the Art and Literature section for the end of the sale, and in it we offer a pristine copy of Steinbeck's *The Grapes of Wrath*, followed by the author's signed contract assigning the film rights of the novel to Twentieth Century-Fox; an early draft page of Henry David Thoreau's manuscript for *A Week on the Concord and Merrimack*; a a Walt Whitman autograph manuscript featuring the author's musings on death, and Ralph Waldo Emerson's own copy of the sermon delivered at his father's funeral.

We'll be in the Magnolia room of the Pasadena Sheraton from Thursday afternoon through the sale on Sunday, and also walking the floor of the fair when we can. We will be completely self-contained at the fair. In addition to the book department staff, we'll have a client services team available to set up registrations, and on the day of the sale, a cashier and a porter to help deliver property to buyers.

Here's hoping for a good fair for all!

JAMES "TED" WATKINS (1957-2015)


James "Ted" Watkins was the eldest of five and the only son of Jim and Helen Watkins. Born in Portland, Oregon, he was educated at Christ the King parish school and La Salle High School before briefly attending Mount Angel Seminary in Saint Benedict, Oregon. Though he did not complete his studies at the seminary, the immersion into philosophy, literature, and religious studies that all undergraduates receive at Mount Angel greatly influenced Ted throughout the rest of his life.

After finishing his undergraduate degree at Portland State University, Ted studied law at Villanova University, completing his degree in 1985. While still in law school, Ted helped to develop a computer program that allowed large financial institutions to administer national cases in various federal jurisdictions. His law career was meteoric, and his namesake firm, Becket & Watkins, grew quickly from a small boutique to a large operation employing hundreds. So successful was Ted that he retired from law at the youthful age of 38, returning to Oregon to pursue his dream of opening a bookstore.

In 2003 Ted opened Gold Beach Books, today the second largest used bookstore in Oregon. Located on the majestic southern Oregon coast in the heart of Gold Beach, the bookstore soon became a haven for bibliophiles of all stripes, offering new releases, yes, but also used books, children's titles, and rare and antiquarian offerings tucked away in the rare book room, all to be enjoyed while nursing a perfect cup of coffee and a freshly baked scones.

While operating the bookstore, Ted also indulged in his lifelong passion of collecting books and manuscripts. (He would not be the first bookseller to use his trade to that end. Looking at all of you reading this catalog *right now*.) Ted's interest was in philosophy, religion, and the history of the Catholic church, and his collection begins with illuminated manuscripts and incunables, travels through to the 18th century to the California missions, and ends up at the 20th century with Catholic writers such as Flannery O'Conner. He was a good client of ours here at Bonhams, a genial friend who loved to laugh and talk about books.

From his 80-acre estate on Pistol River named Camp Esther after his grandmother, Ted read voraciously, enjoyed fine scotch whiskey and the occasional cigar, played poker, connected with friends and family, and quite frankly, made the very best of his all-too-short time on this earth.

RARE 15TH CENTURY MANUSCRIPT OF THE ORDER OF POOR CLARES, the second Franciscan Order, founded by Saint Clare of Assisi inspired and assisted by Saint Francis. The rule of St. Clare is the earliest documented example of a rule for nuns written by a woman.

The present example contains the 1463 statutes of the Poor Clares of Milan (1v-9v), apparently incomplete at the end, followed by the Rule of St. Clare, in a vernacular Italian (10r-15v), and ending with the vow of profession under the rule of St. Clare (15v). The 15th century witnessed a dispute over the interpretation of the rule, with some sects re-asserting the original austerity of the order. This phenomenon likely resulted in the present document, a manuscript reminder of the Rule and its statutes for a reformed community.

Both the rule and statutes are in the vernacular, providing greater accessibility to the women in the order, and the inclusion of a vow of profession at the end points to the practical use of the document (the rule was read to the sisters every Saturday, and the statutes every two months), and the alterations and cancellations within the manuscript show further emendations to the practice. The two cancelled chapters have to do with the activities of the sisters outside the monastery.


FASCINATING ARCHIVE OF CORRESPONDENCE BETWEEN TWO IMPORTANT FIGURES IN THE ANNALS OF 20TH CENTURY SCIENCE. Max von Laue and Moritz Schlick first met as two of Max Planck's favorite students. The correspondence between the two friends covers a number of important years in the lives and careers of the two great men. Von Laue was awarded the Nobel for Physics in 1914, and interestingly, despite being a great friend of Einstein, as well as an early researcher into relativity, he was famously resistant to aspects of Einstein's relativity, in particular his application of gravity. In a 1915 letter, Von Laue goes into some detail on a draft of Schlick's important essay "The Philosophical Significance of the Principle of Relativity," published later that year, and which would provide much of the foundation for his future work. Schlick's writings on the philosophy of science provided a philosophical bridge to the new physics, and in his role as the nominal leader he helped create the inter-disciplinary cooperation that was the hallmark of modern scientific advancement. This important collection of letters reveals the friendly exchange of significant ideas at the leading edge of quantum mechanics.

IMPORTANT AND DETAILED CORRESPONDENCE BETWEEN TWO OF THE GIANTS OF 20TH CENTURY PARTICLE PHYSICS, written during an intensely creative period for both men. Rossi and Heisenberg met in early 1930, and Heisenberg was immediately intrigued with Rossi's experiments with cosmic rays, which was coming into its own as a central focus of particle physics, culminating

in the Nobel Prize for Hess and Anderson in 1936 for their contributions. The correspondence here represents an important scientific dialogue on the front lines of experimental physics at a crucial time in the development of particle physics, taking place just before Heisenberg was awarded his own Nobel Prize in 1932. At the time, Rossi was just beginning a series of experiments with his newly developed coincidence circuit, and Heisenberg, motivated by recent developments in relativistic quantum theory (a field which he helped found), correctly recognized that the study of high-energy cosmic rays was indispensable to the observation and testing of high-energy quanta.

Beginning with two letters from Rossi (dated September 13 and November 19, 1930), and continuing through 1932, the two friends working on the frontiers of quantum mechanics exchanged and shared their experimental progress. The correspondence is full of scientific detail, captured in this central letter from Heisenberg dated January 9, 1932: "Over the Christmas holidays I have had a chance to think about your work in great detail, and have discussed this with Bohr at length. We are now – under the condition that the experiments are correct – in full agreement with you.

Either the radiation is a corpuscular (i.e. electron), in other words the Stoermer Theorie doesn't work, or that the primary radiation is absorbed much faster than it can be expected. The Klein-Nishina formula is probably wrong by a factor of 10."

Prior to Rossi's experiments, almost nothing was known about the composition and strength of cosmic rays. Inspired by the 1929 Bothe-Kolhorster experiment (which recorded a cosmic-ray particle with 40 times the penetrating force of the electron), Rossi conceived and carried out a pioneering set of experiments that gave scientists their first real sense of the velocity, strength, and composition of cosmic rays. Rossi constructed two new types of tracking device for his experiment, each of which recorded triple coincidences of pulses using three Geiger counters separated by shielding blocks of lead, which subsequently became the standard measuring device for cosmic ray research. Rossi's experiments showed that primary cosmic ray particles are both capable of traversing great thicknesses of lead and also capable of precipitating multiple secondary particle showers. These results were so novel and unexpected - no known process at the time could explain the abundant production

of secondary particles - Rossi could not find a publisher for his experimental reports until Heisenberg himself vouched for the truth of the reporting. The letters reflect in real time these experiments and developments, including two Heisenberg sketches of Rossi's famous circuit, including a proposed alteration.

Lengthy, detailed correspondence pertaining directly to major scientific discovery is rarely found in private hands. The Heisenberg-Rossi dialogue contained here represents a remarkable archive containing significant unexplored research potential - capturing the two great scientists as they explore and discuss ground-breaking experiments and theory at the birth of particle physics.

RARE VICTOR HESS MANUSCRIPT, ON COSMIC RAYS. Hess provides detailed commentary on an article central to his own research, being "Influences on Shower and Vertical Intensity of Cosmic Rays" by J. Barnóthy and M. Forró (Physical Review 55, p 868ff). It was for his discovery of cosmic rays that Hess won the 1936 Nobel Prize in physics (shared with Carl Anderson). Hess made his discovery in 1912, collecting ionization data at heights of up to 5,350 meters in a series of daring balloon ascents. "Hess's discovery of what Millikan had named cosmic rays was important not only for what information they might give concerning astrophysical processes and the theory of the Universe, but also important as an especially concentrated form of energy. In cosmic-ray research, Anderson discovered the positron and Powell discovered the pi-meson" (Weber Pioneers of Science p 105). The present is one of only two Victor Hess scientific manuscripts we trace in the auction records (the other last appearing in 1987).

A CLEAN EXAMPLE OF THE GERMAN ENIGMA I MACHINE (HEERS ENIGMA). Patented by Arthur Scherbius in 1918, the Enigma machine utilizes three interchangeable rotors which scramble plaintext messages and produce a cipher text message which is then sent, generally via Morse code, to a receiving party with an Enigma set up in the same configuration as the sending Enigma. All of the machines could use the interchangeable wheels from any enigma, so to find a matching set of wheels with the same serial number as the Enigma is extremely rare. Though the German military was familiar with the Enigma, it was not adopted as their primary cipher device until 1926, when they discovered that all German naval coded messages had been intercepted and read by the British during the latter half of WWI.

It is unknown exactly how many of these machines were made, but we know that their survival rate is very low. There are around 40 examples in museums around the world. The 3-rotor Enigma was used by the German army up to end of the war, by the navy until 1942, and also by the Airforce until c.1944. The Navy changed their machines to M4s in 1942 and the Airforce near the end of the war to M5s and upwards to prevent the Allies continually breaking the code. At the end of the war, rather than have the machines fall into enemy hands, they were destroyed by the German forces upon retreat, many simply thrown into rivers and lakes, and documents pertaining to their manufacture were burned or in many cases simply lost.

This example of the standard three rotor enigma machine "Modell 1" was used principally by the army (Wehrmacht), and was their favored enciphering device. British attempts to break the Enigma code were fruitless for years. The breakthrough eventually came after the creation of the famous British codebreaking center Bletchley Park in 1937. Using the technology transferred to them from the brilliant Polish codebreaking team in 1939, as well as documents supplied by the French Intelligence from a German spy, Alan Turing, along with Knox, Foss and many others were able to break the Enigma code, shortening the war by an estimated two years, and saving countless lives.







The decision has distinct echoes of a slightly earlier dispute between the two parties, from February 1, 1527, in which Monterroso reasserted his claim on "La Malinche," "vna yndia naburia desta tierra, que ha nonbre Marina, la qual dicha yndia hera primeramente de vos el dicho Blas de Monterroso, la qual me fué hurtada, e rresgebida e cobrada, la ayáys e toméys para vos como cosa propia" (Carlo, Índice y extractos de los Protocolos del Archivo de Notarías de México, D.F., p 99).

De Guzman was appointed Governor of Panuco in 1527, as a counter-balance to Cortes, who was seen by the crown as being too ambitious. In 1528 he was appointed President of the First Real Audiencia, and in that position helped to check Cortes's personal power, and to add to his own power and wealth. The First Audiencia was dissolved in 1530 amid rampant corruption, and even as he went on to found several cities, including Guadalajara, De Guzman achieved a reputation as one of the cruelest of the conquistadors.







Although the AdC is not named in the letter, it would almost certainly have been John Aaron Rawlins, who was a loyal friend and confidant to Grant throughout the Civil War, and served as Secretary of War during Grant's presidency.





The mission was part of a coordinated and ill-fated attempt by the U.S. Government to put an end to the Northwest Indian War - Trueman and Harding never delivered their messages as they were mistaken for spies and killed in the attempt by members of the western tribes. This act extends a \$300 per annum stipend to their families, which was extended again at the end of the original 7-year period.





The receipt made out to George Gilpin for "hawling one load wt 2,200 to the Great Falls from Alexandria in very bad weather which took the waggon two days," 110 x 180 mm. The recto signed by George Gilpin and countersigned August 5th 1786 as received by George Gilpin, the verso with note number 206 at upper right, and below signed "allowed" by three Directors of the Potomac Company, George Washington, John Fitzgerald, and Thomas S. Lee. Edges slightly browned. Matted, in a double-sided glass frame.

The Potomac Company was set up in 1785 with George Washington as its first President, to make navigable improvement to the Potomac River which would allow a navigation from the parts of Pennsylvania and Virginia via waterways to the port of Georgetown. Progress was inevitably slow, and at some point indentured and slave labour had to be used to dig the canals and make the locks necessary at various

rapids and falls along the river. George Gilpin was a director of the Potomac Company, a close friend of Washington who served under him during the Revolutionary War. This was one of Washington's pet projects partly because of his large land holdings in West Virginia and Western Pennsylvania (acquired during his days in the British military as a frontier surveyor), which would benefit from such a navigation. He personally invested in the project and appointed two of his military colleagues as Directors, Gilpin, and John Fitzgerald. The company folded and was incorporated into the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal company in 1825 after the Potomac company announced it could not fulfill its charter in 1821.

Given the amount of paperwork that must have been generated by the Potomac Company, it is surprising that just 10 examples of receipts like this have appeared in the last 45 years at auction.

The detailed rendition of the Great Wall with various gaps suggests an accuracy which japanese maps rarely have, while the curious folding map format for a traveller would normally seem quite useful for this period, except that no Japanese were allowed to travel to China under threat of death. The island at the lower right is Okinawa, which at this time acted as an entrepot trading post for Japanese and Chinese trade.

A rare printed proclamation, issued by USMC forces in occupation in Tientsin, after the Battle of Tientsin July 13-14th 1900. The proclamation urges the population to keep calm and by hanging this proclamation on their houses, they accept the protection of the USMC. Soon after the Alliance forces broke into the old city, there were several days of considerable pillage carried out by certain elements of the International Forces. The reports got back to the various Allied commanders and the issue was hushed up, but this American Proclamation shows the US attempting to bring calm and order to their sector. This "banner" was originally written out by the USMC chinese interpreter Wah, and in this case, then lithographed for rapid dissemination through the sector. An early form of this proclamation does not have the corrections in red. We can find only one example of this proclamation at auction, sold in these rooms in October 11 2011 (that copy without the corrections), and Worldcat lists a copy in the William Clements Library Ann Arbor OCLC 123411558, and another copy with the mss corrections in red, is in Stanford UCLA (Accession Mss 2017-141). This example is a variant of both these copies.

A rare early woodcut map of the Siege on the Castle of Osaka during the winter of 1614/15 by forces loyal to Tokugawa Clan, one of the last samurai battles in Japan, which established the Tokugawa Clan as absolute leaders of Japan, retained for the next 250 years. Amongst the flags of the attacking forces on the right hand side of the plan is the fan and circle banner of Satake Yoshinobu (1570-1633), and Naoe Kanetsugu alongside him. The plan shows the position of the forces during the winter siege of 1614/15. The Siege of Osaka took some 7 months, first the Winter Campaign (November 19 - January 22nd), including the Battle of Imafuku to the North East of the city on November 19 1614. In January the Toyotomi agreed terms and the attackers dispersed. But in the Spring of 1615

Toyotomi again gathered his forces and the two armies met in various battles May to June 1615, culminating in the Battle of Tennoji on the plains to the south of Osaka. The Toyotomi lines were broken and the Shogunate troops poured into the castle, sparing few.

Osaka Castle, one of Japan's most famous landmarks, was built by Toyotomi Hideyoshi in 1583, and refortified by his son Hideyori in early 1614. This re-fortification incited the Tokugawa, who had been slowly assimilating the various clans under their domain since 1600. After the siege, and the destruction of the Toyotomi clan, as well as much of the castle, the castle was rebuilt under the new Tokugawa shogun in 1620. It remained a military base and arsenal, but was burned during the Meiji conflicts in 1868, but restored in the 1920s and is now a popular destination for tourists.

We can find no record of this woodcut map, but the Library of Congress has a larger manuscript map of the winter siege of 1614, with a similar depiction of the castle and forces surrounding it that may be a precursor to this woodcut map. Sothebys London in November 2008 sold two larger manuscript plans of the castle after it had been sacked in 1615, dating them [1615, but c.1740].

The route map covers the main islands of Kyushu and Honshu starting on the islands of Tsumima and running through to Mutsu in the North of Honshu. 

James Imray (1803-1870) was a hydrographer, born in London, who established himself in the mid 19th century, as a commercial chart maker, making blue-back charts. He started his career by joining Robert Blanchford as a partner in 1836 and by 1846 had bought out Blanchford, and in 1854 his son James joined the business. During the mid 19th Century Imray was able to forge ahead in the market place by producing sound commercial charts often using information from the British Admiralty charts or US Coastal surveys. They specialized in producing charts of commercial trade routes, and the northern Pacific was an area bursting out commercially, with considerable whaling and American traffic. This North Pacific chart was first issued by James Imray around 1849, and updated regularly with the additional of extra information and more inset small plans.

CHANDLER ON SCREENWRITING. Chandler opens this letter to his agent with a snarky reference to his 1945 article in *The Atlantic*, "Writers in Hollywood," which had apparently been referenced in a recent gossip column by Louella Parsons. "The real purpose of my article was to explain why screenwriting was no fun, and that as long as it isn't any fun it will tend to become more and more mechanical because the only people who will stay with it are the natural-born hacks."

The largest section of the letter, however, seems to refer to the completion of the first draft of Playback, an original screenplay featuring Philip Marlowe that has never been filmed, but which Chandler later adapted into a novel and published in 1958. He writes to his Hollywood agent, H.N. "Swanie" Swanson: On February 21, 1948 I sent the script with final changes to Universal-International by registered mail, and this completed my contractual obligations. Nevertheless, I sat in with Joe for further conferences and on March 23 sent him a rewrite of the first hundred pages of the script." Chandler goes on to mention possible production of the film in Canada (Playback is set along the US/Canadian border) and to complain bitterly that, in spite of having a contract which seemed to give him more control over the filmaking process, "I was just as much bound as thought I were an employee, because the producer was an employee and I had to protect him." An active student, she was notably editor of *The Corinthian*, the college's quarterly which was an outlet for creative writing and was well known for her linocut illustrations, some of which are pictured in these volumes and notably the endpages in the final volume depict her quirky scenes of campus life that are reminiscent of Bemelmans. She is also listed as a member of the yearbook staff, the International Relations Club, the Town Girls' Club (for student relations) and the Newman Club, a group for Catholic students. She was chosen by the student body as one of only twelve seniors who made exceptional contributions to life at GSC for the honor titled "Who's Who in American Colleges and Universities."

The fact that the South in the Bible Belt is in great measure responsible for her literary preeminence now. The Cath. novelist can learn a great deal from the Protestant South." While Leaves of Grass was justly lauded for its celebration of life, Whitman agreed with Traubel's assessment, "If Leaves of Grass is remarkable for anything, it is its celebration of death." In this brief manuscript, Whitman imagines an "autumnal poem" composed "on the theme of that hour - on Death." Unlike Gray's "Elegy" and Bryant's Thanatopsis" or "Flood of Years," Whitman ventures, "the genuine normal spirit and appropriate mood for the hour is a calm

alertness..." and here apparently begins his own elegy, "perhaps / a life of stout toil is over with / over the past not God himself has Power / For what has been has been and I have had my hour." The final lines end with his tribute to Dryden's Imitation of Horace, which, according to Elizabeth Keller who cared for him through his final days, was much on his tongue as he "looked forward to [his death] with fearless expectancy." 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

Any dispute, controversy or claim arising out of or relating to this agreement, or the breach, termination or validity thereof, brought by or against Bonhams (but not including claims brought against the consignor by the purchaser of lots consigned hereunder) shall be resolved by the procedures set forth below.

- (a) Within 30 days of written notice that there is a dispute, the parties or their authorized and empowered representatives shall meet by telephone and/or in person to mediate their differences. - (b) If mediation does not resolve all disputes between the parties, or in any event no longer than 60 days after receipt of the written notice of dispute referred to above, the parties shall submit the dispute for binding arbitration before a single neutral arbitrator. Such arbitrator shall be a retired judge or an attorney familiar with commercial law and trained in or qualified by experience in handling arbitrations. Such arbitrator shall make all appropriate disclosures required by law. The arbitrator shall be drawn from a panel of a national arbitration service agreed to by the parties, and shall be selected as follows: (i) If the national arbitration service has specific rules or procedures. those rules or procedures shall be followed; (ii) If the national arbitration service does not have rules or procedures for the selection of an arbitrator, the arbitrator shall be an individual jointly agreed to by the parties. If the parties cannot agree on a national arbitration service, the arbitration shall be conducted by the American Arbitration Association, and the arbitrator shall be selected in accordance with the Rules of

the American Arbitration Association. The arbitrator's award shall be in writing and shall set forth findings of fact and legal conclusions.

- (c) Unless otherwise agreed to by the parties or provided by the published rules of the national arbitration service:
- (i) the arbitration shall occur within 60 days following the selection of the arbitrator:
- (ii) the arbitration shall be conducted in the designated location, as follows: (A) in any case in which the subject auction by Bonhams took place or was scheduled to take place in the State of New York or Connecticut or the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, the arbitration shall take place in New York City, New York; (B) in all other cases, the arbitration shall take place in the city of San Francisco, California; and
- (iii) discovery and the procedure for the arbitration shall be as follows:
- (A) All arbitration proceedings shall be confidential;
- (B) The parties shall submit written briefs to the arbitrator no later than 15 days before the arbitration commences;
- (C) Discovery, if any, shall be limited as follows: (I)
 Requests for no more than 10 categories of documents, to be provided to the requesting party within 14 days of written request therefor; (II) No more than two (2) depositions per party, provided however, the deposition(s) are to be completed within one (1) day; (III) Compliance with the above shall be enforced by the arbitrator in accordance with California law:
- (D) Each party shall have no longer than eight (8) hours to present its position. The entire hearing before the arbitrator shall not take longer than three (3) consecutive days;
- (E) The award shall be made in writing no more than 30 days following the end of the proceeding. Judgment upon the award rendered by the arbitrator may be entered by any court having jurisdiction thereof.

To the fullest extent permitted by law, and except as required by applicable arbitration rules, each party shall bear its own attorneys' fees and costs in connection with the proceedings and shall share equally the fees and expenses of the arbitrator.

LIMITED RIGHT OF RESCISSION

If within one (1) year from the date of sale, the original purchaser (a) gives written notice to us alleging that the identification of Authorship (as defined below) of such lot as set forth in the BOLD TYPE heading of the catalog description of such lot (as amended by any saleroom notices or verbal announcements during the sale) is not substantially correct based on a fair reading of the catalog (including the terms of any glossary contained therein), and (b) within 10 days after such notice returns the lot to us in the same condition as at the time of sale, and (c) establishes the allegation in the notice to our satisfaction (including by providing one or more written opinions by recognized experts in the field, as we may reasonably require), then the sale of such lot will be rescinded and, unless we have already paid to the consignor monies owed him in connection with the sale, the original purchase price will be refunded.

If, prior to receiving such notice from the original purchaser alleging such defect, we have paid the consignor monies owed him in connection with the sale, we shall pay the original purchaser the amount of our commissions, any other sale proceeds to which we are entitled and applicable taxes received from the purchaser on the sale and make demand on the consignor to pay the balance of the original purchase price to the original purchaser. Should the consignor fail to pay such amount promptly, we may disclose the identity of the consignor and assign to the original purchaser our rights against the consignor with respect to the lot the sale of which is sought to be rescinded. Upon such disclosure and assignment, any liability of Bonhams as consignor's agent with respect to said lot shall automatically terminate.

The foregoing limited right of rescission is available to the original purchaser only and may not be assigned to or relied upon by any subsequent transferee of the property sold. The purchaser hereby accepts the benefit of the consignor's warranty of title and other representations and warranties made by the consignor for the purchaser's benefit. Nothing in this section shall be construed as an admission by us of any representation of fact, express or implied, obligation or responsibility with respect to any lot.
