The American Presidential Experience: A Non-Partisan Tribute to the American Presidency.

Following the tragic events of September 11, 2001, Jim Warlick, owner of DC political memorabilia shop, Political Americana, noted a sharp decline in the numbers of educational tours coming to the nation's capital. Security concerns forced schools to reconsider programs that had provided youth with educational opportunities to learn firsthand. With students unable to travel to DC, Warlick decided to bring DC to them and opened his first presidential museum in Branson, MO. The museum showcased a Boeing 707 Air Force One fuselage, a full-scale Oval Office, replicas of First Ladies' gowns and more than 500 other pieces of presidential memorabilia.

Several years and numerous acquisitions later, Jim wanted to reach an even larger audience and created a traveling, non-partisan educational exhibition celebrating the legacy of the American presidency and took it on the road. Jim's American Presidential Experience has been displayed at Democratic and Republican National Conventions thoughout the years and his full-scale replica Air Force One fuselage was featured in Rockefeller Center in 2004, as it was renamed Democracy Plaza. From state fairs to the Inauguration of President Barack Obama, this exhibit has delighted millions of visitors across the country for nearly 20 years. Consisting of 25,000 square feet of exhibits, this iconic collection features two JFK limousines, the pen used to sign the Peace Corps into permanent existence, and the telephones from which JFK made his final call in Fort Worth, alongside other presidential memorabilia, the Air Force One replica and Oval Office.

Growing up in the small town of Morganton, North Carolina, Jim's interest in politics was spurred on by U.S. Senator Sam Ervin Jr. As a young child, he started collecting political buttons and memorabilia as a hobby, including a bronze bust of JFK, the most significant piece of memorabilia he could afford at the time. In 1980, while working on Capitol Hill, Warlick came up with the idea of designing and selling political campaign buttons. At the Democratic National Convention in New York City that year, Jim began selling them outside his hotel, and quickly realized he could make a better living selling campaign buttons than working on Capitol Hill. Jim started his company Political Americana and began traveling to national conventions and campaign rallies and events selling memorabilia. In 1989, he opened his first physical location, a kiosk in Union Station which quickly grew to his opening 6 retail locations including Boston, Chicago, Baltimore, and Washington, DC. Today, Jim maintains his flagship store, White House Gifts, the premier gift shop in Washington, D.C., located next to the White house, selling a wide array of memorabilia and souvenirs.

In recent years, Jim crossed out another item on his bucket list when he opened Presidential Scoops, the unique DC ice-cream shop paying tribute to Presidential ice cream history, with creative flavors appropriately named for past presidents.

Bonhams is proud to assist with the sale of his fantastic collection of the American presidential Experience, as Jim closes one chapter of his life that began with those early buttons and bronze Kennedy bust.



Now he turns his vision forward (to the past), with the creation of the Workers' Legacy Project in Burke County, North Carolina.

The Worker's Legacy Project features a permanent monument to the millworkers of the Appalachian mountains, titled The Dignity of Work, specifically in honor of his mother, Mary Warlick, who went to work at the age of 16 in a Burke County hosiery mill and worked the same sewing machine for 33 years. Surrounding the monument will be the Walk of Honor which pays homage to the individuals who manned the textile and furniture mills. The project includes a permanent exhibition housed in the History Museum of Burke County, establishing a permanent home as a testament to those millworkers, and comprising a multimedia experience on the rise and apex of these industries, as well as an story corps type oral history project preserving the stories of hopes and aspirations shared through worker testimonies. Additionally, the Mary H. Warlick College Sponsorship program, sponsored by Jim Warlick in memory of his mother, will provide annual scholarships for first-generation college-educated students in their pursuit of an associate degree. The proceeds from the sale of Jim's presidential collection will help to finance this most personal venture.







Property from the American Presidential Experience

A LOCK OF GEORGE WASHINGTON'S HAIR.

Clipped lock of white hair, approximately 35 mm in length, bound in the center by a loop of wire, mounted together with a few tiny chips of cedar from the box that housed Washington's coffin at his funeral, together with an explanatory plaque, a reproduction of a portrait of Washington and a facsimile clipped signature. Matted and framed to 463 x 560 mm overall.

The descriptive plaque indicates that the red cedar chips were from a wooden box that held Washington's coffin, which would refer to the casket pall that was constructed of wood and covered inside and out with black fabric. This was placed into the family vault with Washington's remains, but probably removed when a new vault was constructed in 1831, following a failed attempt by a disgruntled Mount Vernon employee to steal Washington's skull. Though the thief emerged with only the skull of a distant in-law, the incident brought to light the urgent need to move George and Martha's remains to the newly constructed vault called for in Washington's own Last Will and Testament.

GEORGE WASHINGTON CENTENNIAL CELEBRATIONS, 1889.

Two commemorative items produced for the centennial of George Washington's inauguration:

1. ST. GAUDENS, AUGUSTUS. 1848-1907. AND PHILIP MARTINY. 1858-1927. Commemorative medallion, 1889, cast bronze, 115 mm diameter, featuring half-length bust of Washington in left profile on the obverse, and eagle with spread wings over commemorative inscription on reverse. Minor wear.

2. Commemorative "hatchet" form decoration, uniface, undated (but 1889), cast aluminum, 130 x 300 mm, featuring a bust of Washington on the hatchet head, and the inscription "*Washington Inaugurated President Of The US - Apr. 30. 1789*" on the handle.

St. Gaudens designed the medal in the winter of 1888-1889 and turned over the sculpting duties to his assistant, Martiny. 2,000 of the medals were cast by the Gorham Manufacturing Company. The hatchet decoration is a reference to the story of Washington as a boy, confessing to his father that he used his new hatchet to damage his father's cherry tree. The story, illustrative of Washington's innate honesty, is one of his most enduring legends. These decorations are known in other materials, including cast iron and bronze.

A STONE FROM THE WHITE HOUSE.

A mounted fragment of stone removed from the White House during renovation, sandstone, approximately 183 x 175 x 70 mm, with two visible layers of white paint on flat exterior surface, red-brown stained corner of a bubble inside the stone on the back edge, mounted on wooden plinth with brass plaque reading "*White House 1792-1991*."

Irish-born architect James Hoban was selected to design the White House and oversee its construction, as well as that of the U.S. Capitol building. The exterior was painted in a coat of whitewash to seal the porous sandstone. During the War of 1812, the White House was burned by British soldiers, leaving only exterior walls standing, most of which had to be torn down and rebuilt because of structural damage. The primary reconstruction was completed in 1817, although numerous additions and renovations have taken place since then, most notably during the Truman administration.

LINCOLN, ABRAHAM. 1809-1865. Document Signed ("Abraham Lincoln"), as President, printed and partially accomplished in manuscript, being an appointment of John Hano as Deputy Postmaster of Lyons, New York, 244 x 335 mm, July 16, 1861. countersigned the Secretary of State ("William H. Seward"). Matted and framed with a portrait of Lincoln and a brass plaque, to an overall size of 594 x 745 mm.

In silk, with printed colors, 400 x 580 mm, c.1870, folded, with material thinning at creases, a few stains.

A RARE CONTEMPORARY 37-STAR PARADE FLAG, in use for only 10 years beginning in 1867. The 37-star flag flew over only three Presidents: Andrew Johnson (1865-1869), Ulysses S. Grant (1869-1877), and Rutherford B. Hayes (1877-1881).

GARFIELD, JAMES A. 1831-1881. Autograph Letter Signed ("J.A. Garfield"), as President-Elect, to John C. Robinson, offering a belated thanks for Robinson's telegram, 1 p, 8vo, Mentor, Ohio, November 11, 1880, on letterhead printed only with the place. Laid down onto a blank leaf removed from a book.

PRESIDENT-ELECT GARFIELD WRITES A BELATED THANK YOU IN RESPONSE TO A CONGRATULATORY TELEGRAM. John C. Robinson of Binghamton, New York, was a Brigadier General in the Union Army during the Civil War, receiving the Medal of Honor for leading a charge against enemy positions at Laurel Hill, Virginia in 1864. He later served as Lieutenant Governor of New York and was President of the influential Grand Army of the Republic.

Oblong 4to (175 x 252 mm). Engraved portrait of McKinley and Vice President Garret Hobart. Original gold-titled wrappers, bound with silk ribbon tie.

Harrison's election was unusual, in that his predecessor and successor was Grover Cleveland. He defeated the incumbent Cleveland in the 1888 election, campaigning on a platform of protectionist tariffs. The tariffs backfired by inflating the price of imported goods, and Cleveland again became a viable candidate. Harrison was defeated after his first term and Cleveland resumed the presidency in 1893.

An embroidered silk handkerchief linen purse belonging to the First Lady, embroidered with an eagle clutching an American flag above "For Democracy," with plastic "U.S.A." pin beneath, given by Wilson to Maggie Rogers soon after President Woodrow Wilson's 1917 inauguration, 181 x 156 mm, folded, with silk painted American flag pocket inside.

Provenance: Edith Galt Wilson (1871-1962); gift to Maggie Rogers (1874-1963; White House maid, Taft to Roosevelt); by descent to Lillian Rogers Parks (1897-1997; best-selling author; seamstress and White House maid, Hoover through Eisenhower, letter of provenance).

BEAUTIFUL ROYAL PURPLE SILK PURSE EMBROIDERED WITH THE SUFFRAGETTE SLOGAN "FOR DEMOCRACY." According to Lillian Rogers Parks (in a letter included), Edith Wilson gave the purse when she and the President moved into the White House, with the words "President Wilson prefers that I not keep this because someone might see me with it and not understand."

The Hoovers were extremely fond of pets, and had numerous dogs during their years at the White House. King Tut is said to have been his favorite, and was often featured in photos of the President.

FDR'S DEMOCRAT DONKEY TOY FROM THE WHITE HOUSE.

Toy donkey, in plush fabric, wood, and leather, approximately 350 x 430 x 90 mm, with wooden wheels on each foot, joined by two steel axles, electrical cord (for sound?) protruding from left front leg. *Provenance:* Isacc Esperancilla, valet to Presidents Coolidge, Roosevelt, Truman and Eisenhower (with White House card signed by Esperancilla's widow).

This plush toy donkey with a saddle on it lived in the private residence of the White House during Franklin Roosevelt's presidency for the amusement of his grandchildren. The symbolism of riding a donkey, the mascot of the Democratic party, was undoubtedly intentional, even if the joke was lost on the children.

The Frankelite Company made numerous home furnishings such as lamps, door hardware, etc., particularly in the Art Deco style during the 1930s. Roosevelt's widespread popularity, as evidenced by his unprecedented 4 election victories, led to a high demand for patriotic decor bearing his image.

USAAF BLANKET USED BY FDR ON PRESIDENTIAL FLIGHTS. FDR was stricken with polio at the age of 39, resulting in paralysis from the waist down. He continued his political career, but was self-conscious about his disability and could frequently be seen with a blanket across his lap, whether in a wheelchair or car seat. The logo of the U.S.A.A.F. on this blanket dates it from after 1941.

A full-scale facsimile of the Oval Office, measuring 27 x 31 feet, and 13 1/2 feet high, constructed of 8 large wooden panels that fasten together, two doors, shelves, and fireplace built-in, and dressed with a scale fine wood reproduction of the Resolute Desk, including the hinged panel with carved Presidential Seal, circular rug with Presidential Seal, gold executive flagpoles and flags, two off-white sofa couches, 4-drawer bureau, 2 side tables, 2 lamps, standing table, 4 replica presidential portraits (Washington, Jefferson, Jackson, and Kennedy), Childe Hassam *Avenue in the Rain* (replica), grandfather clock, side desk chairs, drapery and bunting, and more [please contact department for a full list of contents], some normal wear from exhibition and use, but overall in presentable, exhibition worthy condition.

FULL-SCALE, EXHIBITION AND FILM SET WORTHY REPRODUCTION OF THE MODERN OVAL OFFICE,

with set dressings and furniture for a complete exhibition, but constructed in pieces so it can be easily customized and tweaked for different uses. The Oval Office includes all furnishings and accoutrements necessary to complete a realistic full-scale reproduction, from a replica of the Resolute Desk, with hinged panel carved with the executive seal, couches, down to the end-tables, wall portraits, a reproduction of Childe Hassam's *Avenue in the Rain*, which has hung in the Oval Office since Bill Clinton's tenure, as well as a bronco sculpture evocative of Remington's Bronco Buster. The attention to detail is astounding, down to the wood in the fireplace, supplied window backdrops revealing the White House gardens, and a facsimile of JFK's rocker designed by the same company who produced the originals.

In 1902, President Theodore Roosevelt first constructed a "temporary Executive Office building" to give the President a location separate from the residence at the White House in order to work from. Roosevelt's executive office was a standard rectangular structure. Under President William Taft, the West Wing was extensively expanded and remodeled and the Executive Office moved to the center of the south side, modeling the President as the center of the administration. When the West Wing was largely destroyed by fire in 1929, President Herbert Hoover rebuilt in nearly the same location. It was President Franklin D. Roosevelt who created the modern Oval Office in 1934. He again extensively remodeled the structure to accommodate an increase in staff, and moved the Oval Office to the Southeastern corner, allowing him easier access from the residences, and where it still stands today.

Jim Warlick's Oval Office exhibition has appeared on *SNL*, *The Today Show*, the cover of Alec Baldwin's *You Can't Spell America Without Me*, as well as the numerous party conventions, inaugural events., A wonderful set or exhibition piece, designed and outfitted with an incredible eye for detail. He signed the National Security Act of 1947 on board, thus establishing the Air Force as a separate branch of service while actually on an airplane. It currently resides in the collection of the National Museum of the United States Air Force in Dayton, OH.

Eleanor Roosevelt wrote to Kennedy soon after the inauguration, "I think "gratitude" best describes the sense of liberation and lift to the spirit which you gave. I have re-read your words several times and am filled with thankfulness. May we all respond to your leadership and make your task easier." Interestingly, Mrs. Roosevelt had opposed Kennedy's nomination in 1960, supporting Adlai Stevenson even as far as the Democratic Convention in Los Angeles. According to Richard Reeves, she "had refused to sit on the inaugural platform with Kennedy and his family, wrapping herself in a mink coat and an Army blanket in the crowd below the stand" (*Profile of Power*, p 421). A rare relic of two of the most important presidencies of the 20thcentury.

THE PEN KENNEDY USED TO SIGN HR7500 ESTABLISHING THE PEACE CORPS, presented to Hubert Humphrey, who sponsored the House bill. The idea of a civilian Peace Corps as an instrument of spreading good will and American democratic ideology around the world was conceived and championed by United Auto Workers President Walter Reuther in the 1950s. He met with candidate Kennedy after the 1960 Democratic National Convention to convince him to make the idea part of his presidential platform. Kennedy signed the executive order that created the Peace Corps on March 1, 1961, and appointed Sargent Shriver as the Peace Corp's first director. The writing on the pen's box, possibly in the hand of a White House staff member, refers to the act's House bill number, and its sponsor in the House, Hubert Humphrey (here mis-spelled "Humphry)." Pen was originally housed in the collection of William H. Perkins, Jr. Perkins served on Presidential Inaugural Committees in 1961, 1965, 1969, and 1973. He was a lifelong lobbyist, first for Continental Casualty where he arranged the insurance coverage for President Kennedy's inauguration. In 1964, he was appointed by President Johnson as a member of the National Armed Forces Museum Advisory Board of the Smithsonian Institution; he was reappointed by Presidents Richard Nixon, Gerald R. Ford, Jimmy Carter, and Ronald Reagan.

Truman had the Independence, and used a smaller Constellation 8800, and Eisenhower employed a number of different planes, but it was J.F.K. who ushered in the jet age of Air Force One when he had a Boeing 707 specifically fitted as a Presidential plane, including bringing in famed designer Raymond Loewy who helped Jackie design the interiors as well as a fresh, distinct livery (exterior design), the basis of which has been used for all Air Force Ones since. This is an exhibition quality full-scale fuselage from a Boeing 707, retrofitted as a replica of Kennedy's original Air Force One in minute detail by Steve Cannaby and Nu-Tek Aircraft Instruments, who also did the Air Force One Flight Simulator for the Ronald Reagan Presidential Museum in Simi Valley, CA. Nu-tek worked from original blueprints and photographs, and including original flight seats converted from the Quayle-Gore Air Force Two.

JFK GOES TO TEXAS.

YARBOROUGH, RALPH W. 1903-1996. Typed Letter Signed ("Ralph W. Yarborough"), to "Dear Friend," being an invitation to attend a fundraising dinner in Austin on the evening of November 22, 1963, with JFK as the guest of honor, 1p, 4to, Washington D.C., dated November 13, 1963. With attached copy of a letter from Governor John Connally to Yarborough and 4 pages of other Democratic party information.

INVITATION FOR A DINNER ON NOVEMBER 22, 1963, WITH JFK AS THE GUEST OF HONOR. On November 21, President Kennedy and the first lady left Washington on Air Force One for a two-day tour of Texas which was to culminate in the dinner in Austin the night of November 22. Obviously the dinner never took place. The flash trip was necessary in order to quell an intraparty squabble that had erupted between Senator Ralph Yarborough with Texas Governor John Connally, which extended to Connally's friend, Lyndon Johnson. Kennedy felt his presence would send a message, and further intervened by asking Connally to give Yarborough a role in the events in Austin. Yarborough put aside his animosity toward LBJ and rode, at Kennedy's request, with the Johnsons in the motorcade in Dallas, two cars behind the President's.

When the Kennedys arrived at the Fort Worth Hotel Texas on the evening of November 21, 1963, they found a room extensively decorated with priceless artworks by Picasso, Monet, Van Gogh, Dufy, and others. According to William Manchester: "In the fatigue of last night and the haste of this morning neither Kennedy had noticed that they were surrounded by a priceless art exhibition ... A catalogue, which had also been overlooked, disclosed that the exhibit was in their honor. 'Isn't this sweet, Jack?' she said ... 'They've just stripped their whole museum of all their treasures to brighten up this dingy hotel suite.' He knew it had been done for her, and taking the catalog he said, 'Let's see who did it.' There were several names at the end. The first was Mrs. J. Lee Johnson III. 'Why don't we call her?' he suggested. Thus Johnson ... became the surprised recipient of John Kennedy's last telephone call" (*Death of a President: November 20 - 25, 1963*, pp 120-121).

The phones with the White House emblem in the rotary were supplied by Southwest Bell. The events of November 22nd would overshadow the charming art exhibition; the art was unceremoniously returned to its owners and the phones to a Southwest Bell warehouse where a manager (and Kennedy supporter) purchased them as souvenirs.

Still bearing the cards with names of the candidates, along with a yellow ballot card marked "DEMONSTRATOR," this voting machine was one of those used by the State of Florida during the election of 2000. On election night November 7, 2000, as results were announced from states around the country, it became clear that the race between George W. Bush and Vice President Al Gore would hinge upon the tallies in a single state, Florida. The national news networks across the political spectrum began to call the Florida race for AI Gore based on exit polls that leaned too heavily on young voters (who would be more likely to participate in those polls), and so it was late in the night when they began to walk back their initial prediction, by which point it became apparent that should Florida change to Bush, he would be the President of the United States. Irregularities in the voting in Broward County, including the now infamous "hanging chad" in which the punch voting machines did not complete detach the paper from the punch holes as the people voted confused the issue, and the case for a recount made its way all the way to the US Supreme Court, where it was finally shut down a month after the election. In the end, the election came down to just 537 votes among 6 million cast in the state, in a country of 210 million eligible voters.

A GROUP OF FIRST LADY REPLICA GOWNS.

1. MARTHA DANDRIDGE WASHINGTON: Full-length 2-piece gown of cream brocade with a square neckline, accented with brown lace trim throughout, with 3/4-length lace-trimmed sleeves, and an opening at the front of the skirt revealing an iridescent brown quilted underskirt. Martha Dandridge Washington became the first "First Lady" before that title was even conceived.

2. MARY TODD LINCOLN: Full-length purple velvet two-piece ensemble consisting of a bodice with a wide V-neck collar festooned with layers of ribbons, with layered 3/4-length sleeves of ribbon and lace, and a vertical wide-striped white cord trim on the bodice and matching skirt, with a small train. Mary Todd Lincoln's inaugural gown may have been the only one equipped with multiple pieces for both day and evening wear.

3. FRANCES CLARA CLEVELAND PRESTON: Full-length 2-piece offwhite gown with a V-neck, 3/4-length sleeves, a small front swag, with floral applique trim throughout, and a small train, bearing an interior label inscribed, "Paris Creations." Frances was the ripe old age of 21 when she took on the enormous challenge of being the youngest First Lady, a distinction she holds to this day. The gown offered here is actually a replica of Frances' wedding gown worn when she married President Grover Cleveland at the White House in 1886, the only time a President and First Lady were wed in a White House ceremony.

4. EDITH KERMIT CAROW ROOSEVELT: Full-length smoky blue 2-piece gown with a fabric design of pinwheels and birds, a square neckline, and draped lace sleeves of cream and gold, bearing an interior label inscribed "Paris Creations." Edith Kermit Carow Roosevelt, whose reign as First Lady and wife of President Theodore Roosevelt lasted from 1901-09, cared so little for her exclusive couture that she often cut up her dresses and reused the fabric. Such was the case with her inaugural gown, half of which was donated to the Smithsonian Institution and the other half crafted by restoration experts.

5. GRACE GOODHUE COOLIDGE: Burgundy velvet ankle-length sleeveless gown with a drop waist accentuated with a rhinestone belt, a tiered skirt of large ruffles, and a long train emanating from the shoulder. Grace Goodhue Coolidge began her career as First Lady in 1923, and her Flapper-style inaugural gown reflected her individuality and embrace of the modern woman. President Calvin Coolidge apparently enjoyed helping his wife choose her wardrobe and likely contributed to her choice of inaugural fashion.

6. ANNA ELEANOR ROOSEVELT: Salmon-colored full-length shortsleeved gown with a matching beaded design at the neckline and on the petal sleeves, with a tassle-style pendant of matching beads at the upper center of the bodice, with the skirt culminating in a long train, bearing an interior label inscribed, "Paris Creations." As the wife of 4-term President Franklin Roosevelt from 1933-45, First Lady Eleanor Roosevelt's heavy schedule as an activist left little time for fashion concerns. Nevertheless, she dazzled her adoring public in inaugural gowns which reflected the style of the day but were classic in their simplicity, much like the lady herself.

7. JACQUELINE BOUVIER KENNEDY: Three-piece ensemble consisting of a sleeveless 2-piece gown with a floral design of silver metallic thread on the bodice and a solid-colored skirt, together with a full-length matching cape with a frog closure at the top and side armholes, bearing an interior label inscribed, "Paris Creations," accompanied by a pair of matching opera-length gloves. Arguably America's most beloved First Lady, Jackie Kennedy elevated the role of couture in the White House as no other presidential wife before. Model slim and with an instinctual fashion sense, she chose Ethel Frankau of Bergdorf Custom Salon to create her stunning inaugural ensemble. During her residence as First Lady from 1961 to 1963, she would primarily engage the services of designer Oleg Cassini (along with a few others) to create her signature look of simple lines and pillbox hats.

8. NANCY DAVIS REAGAN: Two-piece ensemble consisting of an ankle-length sleeveless gown of white with an overlay of lace-like material, together with a matching long-sleeved coat of similar length. Nancy Davis Reagan had the advantage of being in the public eye before her two terms as First Lady to President Ronald Reagan from 1981-89. As a former actress, she understood the value of fashion and its influence on the American public.

9. HILLARY RODHAM CLINTON: Royal blue full-length long-sleeved gown with a lace bodice embellished with matching sequins and a triple-layered iridescent skirt, bearing an interior label inscribed, "Paris Creations." Hillary Rodham Clinton is known for her pantsuits, but at the Inaugural Ball celebrating the Presidency of her husband, Bill Clinton, her glamorous sequined gown, designed by Sarah Phillips, received rave reviews. Clinton went on to serve as Secretary of State under President Barack Obama, as a New York state senator, and as the Democratic candidate for the Presidency in 2016.

James A. Garfield held the office of President of the United States from March 4, 1881 until his untimely death from an assassin's bullet six and a half months later. Shot on July 2, he effectively had just under 4 months of service, and thus examples of his signature are far more rare than every other holder of the office except William Henry Harrison.

The present collection of letters, documents and photographs was amassed over the past 30 years by a discerning private collector, and is now being offered via private treaty by Bonhams.

The collection includes 41 Garfield items, including:

1. An Autograph Letter Signed to Charles W. Clark of Mississippi, June 30, 1881, perhaps the last letter ever written by Garfield.

2. Autograph manuscript, dispatch written by Dr. Willard Bliss and signed by all four of Garfield's attending doctors on July 10, 1881, just 8 days after the President was shot: "Such light changes taken place in the President's condition since our telegram of yesterday ... he received a hypodermic injection of one quarter of a grain of morphine ... both yesterday and the day before the wound was dressed antiseptically twice during the twenty four hours ... this morning it is discharging less pus than yesterday but its appearance is healthy...."

3. A rare carte-de-visite photograph signed "J.A. Garfield," no date, but image taken during his brief presidency, a rare example of a photo signed during his administration.

A JOHN HANCOCK SIGNED APPOINTMENT.

HANCOCK, JOHN. Printed document, accomplished in manuscript, signed ("John Hancock"), being an Massachusetts appointment for Revolutionary War veteran Elisha May as Justice to keep the peace, folio, Boston, March 27th, 1781, countersigned by John Avery, and the oaths certified by W. Spooner and Moses Gill to the verso, repaired at lower fold.

Though never President of the United States, John Hancock was the President of the First Congress and the most recognized signer of the Declaration of Independence, his name literally synonymous with autographs. A fine example of his important autograph, and especially nice for its association with Elisha May and the American Revolution. May was originally a member of the Committee of Safety and marched in the Lexington Alarm, April 19, 1775, and proceeded to fight at Bunker Hill, White Plains, and in the Rhode Island campaign.

RARE FIRST APPEARANCES OF TWO FEDERALIST PAPERS, nos 7 & 8, "To the People of the State of New York," signed "Publius" and penned by Alexander Hamilton. Federalist No 8 addresses specifically the need for a strong Union of the States addresses the Hamilton in order to protect their common interests from both Great Britain and from their neighbors. In Federalist No 7, Hamilton pursues the benefits of Union for New York state in particular.

Ultimately published in book form as *The Federalist Papers*, the series of articles published mostly in the New York Packet under the name Publius stand as one of the most important assertions of the American Philosophy in existence. Written by Hamilton, as well as James Madison and John Jay, the papers argue for the adoption of the American Constitution and set forth the parameters for the newly formed American government including the three branches of government creating the American presidency. The preservation of the Union advocated in Federalist no 8 is in essence this argument for the strong central government, a union of states held together by common interest and headed by a President duly elected by the people for the people.

"Yesterday afternoon, about 4 o'clock the federal convention, after having concluded the important task of framing a federal system of government, broke up: and many of the delegates, we are informed, are already on their way to communicate to their constituents the result of their deliberations. And we trust every friend to the peace and prosperity of America, is prepared to receive with respect, and to consider with candor the propositions which will soon be divulged."

This notice is inaccurately dated September 15, whereas the date of the paper, September 18, is the correct one, a mere typographical error in the rush to go to press with this late-breaking news. The time of the adjournment of the Constitutional Convention was indeed 4 o'clock in the afternoon of September 17, 1787, having been in secret sessions since May. Robert Smith, the printer of this paper, was also among the first printers of the complete Constitution, and this announcement appears simultaneously with Dunlap and Claypoole announcement in the Pennsylvania Packet.

A VERY EARLY AND RARE FULL PRINTING OF WASHINGTON'S INAUGURAL ADDRESS, INCLUDING A DESCRIPTION OF THE CEREMONY AND ITS EVENTS. The Gazette of the United States, prominent New York newspaper and the unofficial organ of the Federalist party, devotes nearly the entire 3rd page to a description of the proceedings: the procession from Washington's house to the State-House, his introduction to the two Houses, the administering of the first oath of office by Robert Livingstone, the speech, and the subsequent prayers. The Gazette reports that after the oath was administered, "The Chancellor then proclaimed him the President of the United States, which was followed by the instant discharge of 13 cannon, and loud repeated shouts: the President bowing to the people, the air again rang with their acclamations." Washington's Inaugural Address marks the beginning of the Democractic experiment developed and set forth in the U.S. Constitution, and Washington sets a lofty tone for the new enterprise:

I behold the surest pledges, that as on one side, no local prejudices, or attachments; no seperate views, nor party animosities, will misdirect the comprehensive and equal eye which ought to watch over this great assemblage of communities and interests: so, on another, that the foundations of our National policy will be laid in the pure and immutable principles of private morality; and the pre-eminence of a free Government, be exemplified by all the attributes which can win the affections of its Citizens, and command the respect of the world.

A 17-foot plus extensive genealogy of Washington's family compiled by eccentric British genealogist James Phillippe, and given to Albert Welles who used it for his 1879 genealogy of the Pedigree of George Washington. Written on large folio sheets in connected sequence, with extensive revisionary notes in pencil – probably by Welles, the Phillippe-Welles genealogy forms the basis for all subsequent work. However, Colonel Joseph Chester from who this manuscript also descends, made the point as early as 1866 that the Laurence and John Washington who are recorded in Virginia around 1657, were not descended from Lawrence Washington of Sulgrave. Later historians have noted its importance, while surmising that it should be accepted only when its connections can be corroborated. Truly, a genealogy of mythic proportions, Phillippe manages to trace Washington's line to Norway where it descended from the Norse God-King Odin.

In 1873, Phillippe presented another one-page, abbreviated manuscript version to President Ulysses S. Grant, which now lives at the National Archives. A fascinating document of the nation's founding President.

A well-provenanced "Athenaeum Type" Portrait of George Washington, possibly by John Vanderlyn (1775-1852), after Gilbert Stuart's version, with the bulge of his lips pushed out by his bulky false teeth, suggesting that this portrait was drawn from life, or copied from a life painting.

This portrait bears many similarities with the only known "official "copy by John Vanderlyn's of the George Washington "Athenaeum" portrait, now residing at the Senate House Museum, Kingston, a gift from a Kingston resident in 1959, and provenanced back to Vanderlyn's nephew. The Senate picture is slightly larger 28 x 33 inches but has a similar ruff at the back of the neck, and a similar rendering of the face. John Vanderlyn was Stuart's pupil from summer 1795 to Spring 1796, living in his house. As Gosman's unpublished biography of Vanderlyn states "Vanderlyn became a member of Stuart's family [in his house in Philadelphia], early in the summer of 1795. He found the painter overwhelmed with commissions as in addition to the demand for portraits, he had many orders for copies of his Washington, the pencil of the youth was employed in dead coloring several of the portraits " which Stuart sold for 100 dollars each. On April 20 1796 Vanderlyn writes to Peter van Gaasbeck of Kingston saying he hasn't painted a portrait of Washington for himself yet, but will try to paint one in the next 2 weeks before he leaves. In letters to friends during this period , Vanderlyn recalls Washington's visits to Stuart's house for his various sittings, Vanderlyn would open the door to the great man and show him upstairs to the studio. The result of these sittings was the magnificent Lansdowne portrait.

Messmore Kendall (1872-1959) was an affluent New York businessman, and through his membership of the "Sons of the American Revolution", (his great-great grandfather was Surgeon General to the Continental Army), he became an avid collector of George Washington artifacts and the Federal Period. In 1916 he purchased a mansion in Dobbs Ferry, which was the supposed HQ of Washington, and began to fill the house with his expanding collection of Washingtoniana, creating one of the finest private collections in the country. There he opened up the house to visitors, eventually loaning his collection to the Federal Hall Museum. Many of the items contained in this collection were believed by Kendall to have been owned by George Washington or have been contemporaneous to him. Many items were acquired from William Lanier Washington, a descendant of George Washington, either directly or at auction. The collection was first exhibited at the Worlds Fair of 1939, and on his death, the collection was given to the Federal Hall Museum Associates, excepting the few pieces that were bequeathed to his heirs.

A fine atmospheric bronze bust of Washington by the foremost sculptor of monuments in the post-war period. De Weldon modeled it on Jean-Antoine Houdon's famous head and shoulders sculpture of George Washington. It is believed that there were about 4 or 5 castings of this bust in bronze, and this is the example retained by the sculptor. Others are known to be in the Washington and Lee University, another in the Army and Navy Club in D.C., and a third at a mid western university.

At the time of this composition, de Weldon was still an up and coming sculptor, having completed his first Iwo Jima Monument in 1945, for which he received International recognition, including a citation in the Congressional Record. In the period before he received the commission in 1951 to design and build the Marine Corps War Memorial in Arlington (one of the pinnacles of war sculpture) de Weldon was flooded with commissions from around the world. He made busts of many WW2 Admirals, Generals, of President Truman, and also found time to cast other patriotic sculptures, such as this Washington bronze.

Writing to Spafford, publisher of the Gazetteer of the State of New York and The American Magazine, he comments, to the degree he can, on recent elections: "I confess I am pleased with the election of Governor Clinton who has done great honour and immortal service to that state ... As to the termination of the Presidential Election, as famous as we New England people are for guessing, I confess myself utterly incapable of guessing how it will end. I hope it will continue the prosperity of the Nation, and indeed I see not how any President can change it. If my son has not done his duty to you in point of civility I shall feel sorry, but he is oppressed with many cares."

The presentation copies in this volume run the gamut of John Quincy Adams' literary output, from the eulogies and political speeches one expects of a career politician to the epic poem on the Norman Conquest of Ireland, *Dermot Mac Morrough....* The poem, composed in the years after Adams' humiliating defeat by Andrew Jackson, was a not-too-subtle allegory of his political fortunes (though he denied any such reading in the text of the poem itself). Dermot's tale, originally reported in Hume's *History of England*, is of an Irish King who angers his neighboring ruler by stealing that man's wife. In order to defend himself, Dermot appeals to the English King Henry II for aid, betraying his homeland and allowing for the annexation of the island by the English.

Adams' choice of subject would have resonated with his readers: Dermot is clearly modeled on Andrew Jackson, a man, Adams believed, who was willing to betray his country for personal political gain. The wife-stealing of Dermot would also have suggested Jackson, who dealt with charges of bigamy over his wife's first marriage during the campaign.

Andrew Bigelow was a Unitarian Minister who served parishes in Medford and Taunton, MA. He was the son of Timothy Bigelow who served as Speaker of the Massachusetts House of Representatives from 1805-1806, 1808-1810, and 1812-1820. Like John Quincy Adams, the younger Bigelow was a graduate of Harvard, and harbored literary pretensions: not long after he graduated from Divinity School he published *Leaves from a Journal: or Sketches of Rambles in North Britain and Ireland* (Boston: 1821) and *Travels in Malta and Sicily* (Boston: 1831).

PRESIDENTIAL CANDIDATE WILLIAM HENRY HARRISON WRITES TO DEFEND HIS RECORD IN THE WAR OF 1812. Running largely on his distinguished record during the War of 1812, having earned his nickname Tippecanoe for his actions at the battle there, Harrison reacts sharply and swiftly to accusations that he was not present at the Battle of the Thames. Harrison had previously received great praise for his leadership of the US Army during the battle, and his successful Presidential campaign rested on that leadership. He writes to Moses B. Corwin of the Ohio legislature demanding he contact Mr. Flood, who had made the accusations, as well as to write to four distinguished veterans still living who had been there on that day and served alongside him, acting Inspector General of the Army (in 1813), Charles Todd, General John O'Fallon, Honorable John Chambers, and Speaker of the KY House of Representatives, John Speed Smith. As it happened, Rep Isaac Crary of Michigan repeated the accusation on the House floor on this same day, and Corwin's cousin Thomas responded the following day, laying waste to Crary's accusation, and effectively ending Crary's political future. Corwin's speech depicted the Militia General Crary (in his home state of Michigan) battling the terrors of his parade day, before emerging victoriously from the parade and drawing his sword "with an energy and remorseless fury he slices the watermelons that lie in heaps around him". The speech is considered a masterpiece of eloquence, and Harrison's reputation was secured.

Harrison on the same day, marshaling his defense, dispatched a letter to O'Fallon requesting him to send answers to the questions which would be posed by Corwin (sold Forbes Collection, Heritage, 2016). Secure in his role as military hero, Harrison proceeded to win the election in a landslide, but famously caught cold while delivering the longest Inaugural Address in American history on a cold, blustery day, and succumbed to the illness after serving only a month as President.

"Shortly thereafter ... the Sheriff of Champaign County, State of Illinois, came to [Caldwell] and informed him that the said horse was the personal property of a resident of the town of Urbana in Champaign county " Lincoln closes by stating that he is bringing suit to recover the purchase price. On the verso, he adds a note agreeing to a change of venue to the 8th Judicial Circuit, which covers Champaign County.

Daniel S. Dickinson (1800-1866) served as US Senator for New York from 1844-1851 on the Democratic ticket, and from 1862-63 was Attorney General of the State of New York (still a Democrat but endorsed by the Republican Party). He was briefly considered as a Vice-Presidential candidate in 1864 when Lincoln hoped to demonstrate unity by including a pro-war Democrat on the ticket.

Campaign flags from 1864 are much rarer than those of 1860, probably because the war took up the resources that might otherwise have been available. Those designed with 36-stars (Nevada would not join the Union until the following year) are even rarer, and we know of only one other 1864 36-star campaign flag with the Lincoln portrait. WRITTEN ON THE DAY OF LINCOLN'S ASSASSINATION, A STILL FREE JEFFERSON DAVIS CONTINUES HIS FLIGHT. With the defenses of Richmond collapsing, Confederate President Jefferson Davis fled south, temporarily establishing a new Capitol at Danville, VA, but by April 10th was on the move again. With Lee's surrender on April 9th, many of Davis's Generals were very grim about their prospects, and on the 13th, from Greensboro, NC, Davis ceded their wishes and allowed General Joseph Johnston to hold a conference with Sherman. When Lincoln was shot on the 14th, which Davis would not learn of until the 19th, Davis's prospects became considerably darker, as Johnson and his Secretary of State Stanton were presumed much less forgiving to the Confederacy.

The telegram from S.W. Ferguson who had advanced South of Greensboro urges Beauregard to issue orders to fix the railroad bridge so that the rest of the fleeing Southern troops can get across, and Jefferson's not urges Beauregard to do the same. While Beauregard and Johnston would surrender the Confederate troops on April 26th, Davis would continue to move South, hoping to find an opportunity to negotiate better terms for his surrender. On May 10th, he was finally captured by Union soldiers, while wearing his wife's cloak and black shawl, leading the Northern press, fueled by Secretary Stanton, to declare him the "President in Petticoats," and inspiring a wide range of folk legend (see following lot).

Kennedy, and was commended in a letter from Thomas Ewing: "In making [that] decision, you knew perfectly well that it could consign you to private life and the vehement denunciation of almost all your party friends."

The Impeachment trial of Andrew Johnson was the first Impeachment in American history to come to trial, and though he was found not guilty, reflected the strength of vision of the Founding Fathers in setting up the structures of the democratic government. Of particular interest, the Presidential plane took Bradley and Harriman, as well as Rusk, Pare and others, to the Wake Island Conference (designated as "Wake Island- McArthur Conference") on October 15, 1951. The location was chosen so that MacArthur would not have to travel far from his command in Korea. Truman and MacArthur appeared to have come to an understanding despite their differences on Korean War policy, but it was not long before the animosity between them resurfaced, with Truman ultimately relieving MacArthur of his command.

WEBSTER & CO. / CHARTA PERFECTA," February 24, 1943, *"My dear General"* in Eisenhower's hand at the head, tri-fold creases for mailing, light stains, accompanied by a contemporary carbon draft of the French translation.

EISENHOWER WRITES AS COMMANDER OF THE ALLIED FORCES TO CLARIFY POINTS GENERAL GIRAUD RAISED IN THE "ANFA" MEMORANDUM. As the Anfa Conference at Casablanca came to its conclusion, General Henri Giraud held a short meeting with President Roosevelt, in which he delivered to Roosevelt two memoranda dated January 24, 1943, outlining Giraud's plan for French-Allied relations, including Giraud's role as well as specific promises of arms and equipment for French troops. Remarkably, without passing it to his advisers or to his British counterpart Winston Churchill, Roosevelt signed the document, beginning a flurry of emendations and negotiations between the Allies.

Here, Eisenhower writes to Giraud to clarify those promises, reiterating the American intention to supply "the necessary materiel [sic]," but that regarding the discussions at Anfa, "the intent was to arrive at a basic declaration of principles rather than to a detailed agreement of items or quantities." Eisenhower's diplomacy and ability to encourage cooperation was uniquely suited to the role as Allied commander, and would pave the way to his ascendancy to the presidency in years to come.

JFK'S ICONIC LEATHER BOMBER JACKET, GIVEN TO DAVID POWERS, FRIEND, CONFIDANT AND SPECIAL ASSISTANT TO THE PRESIDENT, AS WELL AS THE FIRST AND LONGEST CURATOR OF THE JFK LIBRARY AND MUSEUM. On a cold winter's night in 1946, a young John Kennedy knocked on a Charlestown tenement door and announced "My name is Jack Kennedy. I am a candidate for Congress. Will you help me?" The man on the other side of that door, David F. Powers, initially said no, but when he saw the future President speak the following day, he changed his mind, beginning one of the most important friendships of the 20th-century. Powers was known officially as the "Special Assistant" to the President, but often referred to by White House colleagues as "John's other wife." Powers was principal gatekeeper, fixer, sounding board. jester and, finally, keeper of the flame. After JFK's death, Bobby Kennedy tapped Powers as the shepherd of the Kennedy legacy and first curator of the JFK museum when a nascent collection traveled the world in 1965, until his retirement from the JFK Library in 1994. The iconic leather G-1 bomber jacket was given by Kennedy to Powers in 1962 or 1963, and Powers treasured the jacket throughout his life. According to a letter enclosed from Powers's son David, he would often pull the jacket out and talk about the President. Included in the lot is a letter from Ronald Reagan, thanking Powers, "This is to express my deepest gratitude for the loan of President Kennedy's Air Force One jacket that has been included in our first major exhibit at the Ronald Reagan Library." The Reagan Library exhibit also included George Washington's map of Mount Vernon, John Adams' silver baby rattle, and a saxophone from Bill Clinton.

An important relic of the American presidency, this spectacular jacket is a testament to one of JFK's most important friendships.

My name is Dave Powers and my late father was David F. Powers, Special Assistant to President John F. Kennedy, and Curator at the Kennedy Library and Museum in Boston. Many consider my father to have been President Kennedy's best friend and closest confidante. They campaigned together from 1946 to 1963, and travelled the world together on presidential visits from 1961 to 1963. My father was in the fateful motorcade in Dallas, right behind President Kennedy's limousine. Of the many personal items that President Kennedy had given my father during their time together, the Bomber Jacket was his most cherished and he proudly wore it on the most special occasions during the year. This would include Saint Patrick's Day in Boston; the Boston Red Sox Home Opener; World Series Games; JFK's Birthday and his own Birthday; and always on Election Day.

My first memory of the Bomber Jacket was from the many games of touch football played in the backyard of Robert F. Kennedy in McLean, Virginia. These games were always full of celebrities and Olympic athletes, and Bobby would always make his grand entrance wearing his bomber jacket for the warm-up session. When I would return home from these games, and relay the highlights to my father, including Robert Kennedy's 'awesome jacket', my father would typically retrieve his bomber jacket from its secure location, and convey some of his favorite memories of President Kennedy. These were treasured moments for a youngster, who was so impressed that his father had received this amazing bomber jacket from President Kennedy. My father repeated on many occasions that he was the luckiest newsboy in the country to have worked for President Kennedy in the White House and to be wearing the President's bomber jacket as the ultimate memento.

It is only fitting that this memo be dated March 17, 2013, as one of my father's favorite memories, as a native of Boston, was marching in the Saint Patrick's Day Parade with John F. Kennedy, candidate for Congress. Little did they know this would lead to the presidency of the United States, and a remarkable friendship of two Veterans, who had very little else in common. For my father, the Bomber Jacket epitomized his favorite recollections of President Kennedy, as the survivor of PT 109 and the greatest man he ever knew.

Jackie likens Ari to some of the mythical characters in Homer's work: "Dear mortal, go in joy: at the turn of the seasons winter to summer, you shall bear me sons; no lovemaking of gods can be in vain. Nurse our sweet children tenderly, and rear them. Home with you now, and hold your tongue, and tell no one your lover's name ... though I am yours POSEIDON, Lord of surf that makes men tremble." The whole ensemble, the choice of images, the choice of texts, Jackie's copying out of the Greek text, all show the deep love that had developed between Jackie and Ari, and their mutual bond to their children. It has often been said that the marriage of Onassis and Jackie was a business arrangement, she seeking the physical security he could provide after both her husband and brother-in-law had been assassinated, and he seeking a glamorous wife. Although that might well have been the case in the beginning, this carefully and lovingly composed album, combining Jackie's selection of quotes from Homer, with gorgeous family photos, belies that rumor, and is, in many ways, a true love poem by Jackie for Ari Onassis.

Preston Bruce, White House Doorman

"Bruce, he runs the place ... "



The son of a South Carolina sharecropper, Preston Bruce came to Washington, DC, in the 1920s to further his education and pursue improved job opportunities. However, jobs in DC were few and far between, so with no immediate prospects and limited income, Preston drew on his skill as a barber to support himself and his future family.

His first government position was that of messenger for the District's Corps of Engineers who were building the Pentagon. In 1953, at the end of the Truman administration, Preston went to work at the White House, where he proceeded to serve as doorman for five Presidents – from Eisenhower through Ford. Preston's ability to adjust to the various personalities of each First Family and to adapt to the different leadership styles, daily routines and lifestyles of each new President earned the respect and admiration of all with whom he worked.

In his position as Doorman, Preston was responsible for greeting any and all guests visiting the President and any member of the First Family, from personal friends to Heads of State, and escorting them to the proper individual. He also brought the briefing papers for the day to the President first thing in the morning and secured the family quarters at night once everyone was settled for the night. In addition, he welcomed individuals attending State Dinners, giving them their table assignments and turning them over to the assigned military escort. Preston's days were long and full, but he enjoyed every minute.

Serving five Presidents over the span of twenty-two years, Preston lived history as it unfolded, from the recovery of the country following WWII; through the Cuban missile crisis and the assassinations of John F. Kennedy and his brother Robert; to the Civil Rights movement, Viet Nam and the killing of Martin Luther King; to Watergate and Nixon's resignation. President John F. Kennedy used to introduce him as "Bruce, he runs the place." Preston retired after a long and fulfilling career, and is remembered as a gentleman whose graciousness, dignity and integrity endeared him to each of the First Families that he served.

This collection, spanning five presidential administrations, contains items from each, and includes pieces such invitations to and programs from State Dinners; recordings of various artists who entertained at the White House; signed photographs from numerous dignitaries; and many other pieces of White House memorabilia.

The idea of the State Dinner as a successful way of aiding diplomacy has been established for many centuries, but in the USA a place to conduct such a dinner on a larger scale only really emerged with the reconstruction of the White House in 1902 and the remodeling of the interior 1948-1954. In the laying out and organization of the State Dinners, a lot falls on the First Lady, and it was Jackie Kennedy who changed the layout from a long formal table to a larger number of round tables allowing more people to attend, now up to 140. Some presidents and their wives enjoy the State dinners, while others do not. The idea of entertainment after the meal and speeches came into play in the mid 20th century, and became a good way of showing off the cultural life of the USA.

A fascinating group of relics from the White House, the wallpaper is annotated with a note that this was from the Blue Room, but descriptions of Jackie Kennedy's redesign of the room do not mention a classic French wallpaper, and it may well have come from another room in the house. The red and green fragments are all left over from Jackie' Kennedy's refurbishment of the Red and Green State Rooms of the White House by Boudin and Parish, between 1961 and 1962. In the Red Room Jackie chose Boudin's choice of a cerise silk furniture fabric for the walls, with a broad band of decorative silk tape to border the panels. In the final version of the room the silk tape was never used. Boudin also chose a cerise silk material for the drapes. In the Spring of 1962, for the Green Room, Jackie chose Boudin's wall covering of a moss-colored silk in a moire pattern, and the French firm of Tassinari and Chatel were commissioned to make up the fabric.

Jackie loved the redecoration, and artistic renderings of these rooms were used as Christmas gifts by the Kennedys in 1961 and 1963.

Robert Sargent Shriver Jr, had married Eunice Kennedy, JFK's sister, and under the Kennedy administration helped create the Peace Corps, a role he continued under the Johnson Administration. Shriver heard of JFK's death on the evening of the 22nd November, and hours later was asked by Jackie to arrange JFK's funeral on the 25th November. On the evening of the 22nd , he managed to arrange an honor guard and burning torches to be laid out to receive JFK's body back at the White House at 4.30am.

He masterminded the complete operation, to inviting the Heads of State, arranging for Kennedy's body to be set in place at the Capitol, and the large processions on the day itself. He successfully organized, in 48 hours, the solemn and poignant events around the funeral of JFK. In the funeral procession Shriver walked behind Jackie and the Children.
